

WELCOME TO THE 2018–2019 SOCIETY SEASON

Our first meeting of the new season will be on Wednesday,

September 26, 2018, starting at 7pm. It will be a print critique night, hosted by Robert Coppola, to get us ready for the upcoming competition season. Please bring one matted print (not previously entered into competition) for discussion and a chance to win a \$25 Hunt's Gift Card. We are in the process of fine-tuning our calendar for the upcoming season and you can view all current scheduled meetings and events on the society's website. You'll be pleased with what has been scheduled at this time!

Last year we implemented significant changes based on member input which centered around meeting time and frequency of meetings. We also introduced efficiency changes such as online membership renewal, banquet sign-up via PayPal as well as encouraging the online printing of print night competition cards. These changes helped move the Society forward while preserving our traditions of friendship, learning and camaraderie via a love of photography. For the 2018–2019 season we'll be implementing a few more changes that will address some equity situations in our competitions as well as move the Society towards more efficiency. We anticipate that these changes will have minor impact on our membership. Here they are:

"Rainchecks" for members asked to judge competitions

Occasionally a scheduled judge will not be available for a club competition. When that happens, we turn to an experienced member and ask them to judge. This usually happens at the last minute and, if the member planned to compete, they must withdraw their images from competition that night. Starting next season, the member judging a competition will receive a "raincheck" to enter two additional images (print or projected, depending on which competition they judged) in a future competition.

Too Many Entries

Occasionally we will have a member exceed the allowed number of entries in a club completion. Our print and projected image chairs make every effort to catch these extra entries...unfortunately, some slip through. If this situation occurs in the future, the member entering too many entries will forfeit their highest scoring entry in that competition for that night. We recognize that these situations happen very infrequently but feel we should have a procedure to address them. I have to confess that I've entered too many images in a projected image competition once before; fortunately, none of the images placed.

Elimination of PSA Competitions

Due to a lack of interest, we are not participating in the PSA competitions in the coming year. PSA competitions are a time- and labor-intensive effort and we have seen declining interest over the past few years. Members always have the option to join PSA as an individual and participate in their monthly competitions directly.

Name Tags

We will be moving towards a member-printed name tag similar to the way you are able to create print competition cards. A template will be provided on our website. This change has the advantage of allowing you to create and print a name tag once dues are paid, or immediately replace a lost or damaged tag. We will continue to supply name tag holders. You'll receive more information on this change in the coming weeks.

I realize that change isn't popular. However, these changes provide guidance and efficiency for our coming year. Questions? Please let me know.



SPECIAL GUEST GUEST LECTURE SHOOTING CLOSE TO HOME - OCTOBER 17 by Jim Craner

It's an old mantra-but a true one-good images can be made anywhere. It only takes imagination, a discerning eye, reasonable technical skills, and the perseverance to make it happen.

We often overlook the great photographic opportunities that are right under our noses at home. I did for several years—but finally saw the light (pun intended). This talk will feature a slide show with music featuring images captured on our property, or in the immediate vicinity, over approximately 10 years.

After retiring in 2001, I decided to pursue wildlife photography and started traveling widely to a "bucket list" of places I had selected in the course of studying the work of photographers I admired. In addition to decent images, I thoroughly enjoyed the good times, and camaraderie of working with other photographers in the field. When my wife joined me in retirement, we acquired the large(ish!) country property where we now live, became involved in equestrian activities, as well as animal rescue. Missing the excitement of exotic locations and animal species; I put aside "serious" photography for several years. However after creating something of a wildlife habitat around our home, observing the prevailing light, atmospherics, and the backdrop of changing seasons I realized I was missing good photographic opportunities.

I recall a talk I attended many years ago given by Freeman Patterson. He remarked that most of his best images were taken in two locations his home in Nova Scotia and a treasured haunt of his in Africa. His point was that the intimate knowledge of a location, and being ready to react quickly to exciting situations, inevitably leads to the best images. Because we spend a lot of time working on our property, I've become intimately familiar with how the light hits all parts of at various times of day, and in different seasons. I'm also aware of what subjects are likely to appear -when and where. I always keep a basic camera "kit" at the ready, and try not to let the more mundane demands of daily life distract me from trying to make good images.



In addition to the above material, I will include a very brief technical piece based on what may seem an unusual premise. That is: making good prints actually starts in the field-not at the computer. Every so often, it is good discipline to review those basic skills that impact the quality of our photographic work. One of those-for those who print their work-is to think of the print right from the outset...not as an afterthought.

* PHOTOGRAPHING MODELS * A HANDS-ON PHOTO WORKSHOP with Doug Mitchell Saturday, November 3, 2018

This workshop will offer an introduction and hands-on opportunity to work with studio lighting and models. Beginning with studio strobes and camera settings we'll also touch on triggering and control of lighting, general posing concepts and the basics of working with models.

The hands-on portion of the workshop will offer the chance for attendees to work with two experienced models shooting with high and low-key studio setups. Working in groups, attendees will alternate working with each model at each set. For the second half of the session the models will change looks and once again attendees will alternate between the sets shooting new looks.

Following the shooting sessions there will be a Q&A period providing an opportunity for questions, helpful tips and feedback.

As a final wrap-up we will touch on the use of speed lights for off camera flash photography showing how they can be used similar to studio lighting for indoor and outdoor photography. This will offer a foundation and perhaps encouragement to use off camera flash as a creative tool to improve lighting and dimension while working with available light.

Doug Mitchell has been a photographer for over 25 years and has shot a variety of work including print publication, fashion, model, wedding and concert photography. He regularly shoots both studio and outdoor photography.

On July 13–15, 2018, the New England Camera Club Council (NECCC) held their 73rd Annual Photo Conference at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, MA. For those not familiar with the conference, it is a multifaceted event targeting all skill levels and multiple interests. While offering a fantastic opportunity to network with your SPS friends, it also gives a chance to make new friends who share your passion for photography. The conference is also designed to inspire, educate, entertain, and so much more.

Let me tell you about some of the opportunities to learn. There were plenty of course topics to choose from. A sampling of the many topics included were nature, creativity, iPhone/SMART phone, digital photography editing software, still life, and portrait photography. Canon sponsored Darrell Gulin, Canon Explorer of Light, who presented the keynote program "VISION: Capturing Moments on all 7 Continents." Accompanied by stunning images taken in his travels, Darrell's verbal presentation was educational, entertaining, and inspirational.

If a change was desired from sitting in a classroom, and if we had an itchy finger yearning to push some camera buttons, the NECCC had that covered with numerous hands-on photo opportunities, interactive sessions, and demonstrations. Whether it be photographing models, people in character (Steampunk, Cosplay, Renaissance, etc.), raptors, critters, water droplets, frozen flowers, glassware, or even one of the classic cars provided by Cam Snappers Club, there always seemed to be something worthy of pointing a camera at.

Are you competitive, need inspiration, or do you just appreciate viewing the work of other artists? Opportunity was available to experience collectively the talents of other photographers. Registrants were encouraged to submit print images and digital images for photo contests.

services? As in previous years, Hunts Photo & Video was there with camera equipment, accessories, and free sensor cleaning. Precision Camera offered free camera and lens testing. Multiple vendors were on-site to let registrants borrow cameras, lenses, and other equipment. Canon even extended an offer for a free large format printout of one of your images. SPS WEBSITE GARNERS HONORABLE MENTION IN 2018 PSA COMPETITION (Large Club Division)

The 2018 Annual PSA Website Contest provided an opportunity for PSA Clubs and Councils to receive feedback on the strengths and weaknesses of the sites as evaluated by a panel of knowledgeable judges. Award recognition was given to those sites the judges rate most successful based on criteria detailed within the score sheets under the categories listed.

Along with the categories listed below, this year the Co-Directors' intent was to give judges an opportunity to add points based on their overall website response using criteria such as: the site drew the viewer in, enticing the judge to become more familiar with the club beyond the task of reviewing the site; the site showed exemplary creativity above the expected norm, and was in that judge's opinion, an overall favorite site from those submitted (regardless of the specific points earned). Overall points will be added to the criteria scores. We feel there is merit to consider these impressions since sites vary in their individual direction, purpose and webmaster expertise, and attendees at the PSA conference have expressed interest in some attention to overall impressions. PSA realized this was covered somewhat in First Impressions, but the totality of the site (other than the overall score) has not always been considered in past years. While we understand that there may be some concern relating to possible bias from the Judges, our experience in this position has found all of our judges to be professional and unbiased.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

First impressions are everything. Research shows that a site visitor makes up his/her mind within the first 5-10 seconds whether to load a website or hit the back button. The home page is highly visible and should offer something new or original if you hope the first time or returning visitor will stick around. A good home page should convey professionalism, creativity and captivate interest while providing use of navigational links and sections to direct access throughout your website. The menu or toolbar should let the reader know what the reader can expect from your site and be easy to understand. Overall, a good home page design should be appealing, relevant, easily understood and focus on the key points of who/what you are.



DESIGN

Overall design and appearances do matter. Good use of color, meaningful graphics that add interest to your text, high quality images and uncluttered layouts that allow visitors to focus on your message should be utilized. Your layout should be polished and professional. Minimize your use of anything that is going to cause your site to take a long time to load. Don't over complicate things.

CONTENT

Content is the substance of web pages and consists of the information that makes up each page. The body of your website should be well organized. All Information should be up to date, accurate and interest guests. State the purpose for expected users of your website. Be clear, concise and compelling while focusing on the key content of your site.

SITE EFFECTIVENESS

You should have prominent, intuitive and logical navigation that is user friendly, simple and indicates where you are on the site. It should be easy to use and pain free. Make sure to have a "home" link on your menu/toolbar. Good websites with many pages have a search tool to assist their readers while keeping other navigation tools consistent for ease of use.

PROFESSIONALISM

Professionalism speaks for itself including observing copyright laws, 3rd party acknowledgments, disclaimers, and terms and conditions of site usage.

SPS NEWSLETTER GARNERS 2ND PLACE AND "BEST USE OF COLOR" IN 2018 PSA COMPETITION (Large Club Division)

Two sets of three qualified judges independently review the groups' entries. The Council & Chapter's group is judged using a different worksheet than the Clubs. Awards are determined based on these ratings. The size of the newsletter, the use of color, and whether or not advertisements are used, have no bearing on the awards. Content, layout, good use of space and photos, neatness, ease in reading, simplicity, and style are of basic importance.


