

~ PHOTOGRAPHING MODELS ~ A HANDS-ON PHOTO WORKSHOP with Doug Mitchell

Saturday, November 3, 2018

This workshop will offer an introduction and hands-on opportunity to work with studio lighting and models. Beginning with studio strobes and camera settings we'll also touch on triggering and control of lighting, general posing concepts and the basics of working with models.

The hands-on portion of the workshop will offer the chance for attendees to work with two experienced models shooting with high and low-key studio setups. Working in groups, attendees will alternate working with each model at each set. For the second half of the session the models will change looks and once again attendees will alternate between the sets shooting new looks.

Following the shooting sessions there will be a Q&A period providing an opportunity for questions, helpful tips and feedback.

As a final wrap-up we will touch on the use of speed lights for off camera flash photography showing how they can be used similar to studio lighting for indoor and outdoor photography. This will offer a foundation and perhaps encouragement to use off camera flash as a creative tool to improve lighting and dimension while working with available light.

Doug Mitchell has been a photographer for over 25 years and has shot a variety of work including print publication, fashion, model, wedding and concert photography. He regularly shoots both studio and outdoor photography.

Breezy (left) and Perpetua (right) will be our models!




There will be two groups of six (6) photographers, each photographing one model. Photographers will be given a specific amount of time to shoot. Once the group has finished, they will switch and photograph the second model.

Models and photographers must sign a model release. Participants must provide one high-res image of each look (no logo/signature) for each model, as well as smaller signed jpegs as desired.

FULL FRAME MIRRORLESS ROUNDTABLE November 14

Some of us who "downsized" to micro 4/3 mirrorless camera lament the fact that they are no longer shooting full-frame. While Sony was the only one in the full-frame mirrorless marketplace, that is changing. Now there are options from Panasonic, Nikon and Canon.



Sony A7 III (24.2 megapixels)

Why go mirrorless?

There are some major advantages:

- 1 Lighter weight.
- 2 Smaller in size.
- 3 No shutter...no vibration.
- 4 Generally better suited at video capture.

In a mirrorless camera, light passes through the lens and right onto the image sensor, which captures a preview of the image to display on the rear screen. Some models also offer a second screen inside an electronic viewfinder (EVF) that you can put your eye to.

Will you sacrifice image quality?

Generally, no. Mirrorless camera manufacturers are producing more sensitive chips that better suppress noise.

Details are still being worked out for this presentation. If you are using a full-frame mirrorless camera, let us have your feedback.

PHOTO ESSAY INSPIRATION - November 28 hosted by Dow Smith

The goal of this evening's presentation is to get members inspired and enthusiastic about entering our annual Photo Essay Contest, which will take place this season on March 20, 2019. That's plenty of time to get on your thinking caps on and create a digital, book or print photo essay on a subject near and dear to your heart. Everyone is a winner here...you create something meaningful for you to preserve your memories for many years to come.

And, who knows, you may even win a ribbon!

Photo Essay Competition Rules:

Print essays are a collection of prints displayed in some fashion. Most typically they will be mounted on a board, but any method of presenting a collection of prints that can be physically managed by the entrant is allowable.

Projected essays are a collection of images that will be projected in some fashion, typically, but not necessarily, accompanied by a soundtrack. The presentation medium may be a digital slide show with or without music or sound, a video, or just a series of digital images. All projected essays must be in a format that is compatible with the projection equipment available on the night of the competition. Important Note: Digital essays must be submitted to Dow Smith by March 13 to assure compatibility with the Club's software.

Book essays are a collection of images assembled into a bound book such as are available from vendors like Shutterfly, Snapfish, Blurb and others.

The rules for entry are as follows:

- One entry per person per category [print, projected, book].
- Maximum length of a projected essay is 8 minutes. Suggested and preferred length is 3 to 5 minutes.
- Participants are encouraged to use only their own images. Other images may be used only if they are vital to the narrative quality of the essay. Any images not made by the participant must be credited. No more than 10% of the total images may be non-participant images.
- It is the participant's responsibility to know the rules. A submission outside of these guidelines will not be accepted.

F@CUS ON

Like a lot of other folks, I started out in photography in my youth by taking snapshots of family and friends. Yes, with my mother's Brownie box camera. Then, in my 20's, I decided I needed a "real" camera and bought a Honeywell manual SLR. I looked very cool, but my pictures didn't. I had no idea what to do with things called aperture, shutter speed, and ASA settings. Most of the time when, and if, I got a decent picture it was by dumb luck. I didn't give up. In 1985 I bought a Minolta Maxxum 7000, the first fully integrated automatic camera. Life and my pictures got much better. I was truly enjoying taking pictures. I started reading everything I could find about photography. More knowledge, more fun.

I was enjoying it so much, in my early 50's I decided this was going to be my retirement hobby. But I wanted to do it right. I enrolled in a Photography 101 night class at Sage JCA. We started from scratch using simple manual cameras and black and white film. And, of course, we developed our film and photos in the school darkroom...I was hooked! I set up a darkroom in my basement and spent many weekends "in the dark."

One of the best pieces of advice I got from my instructor was to join a local photo club to continue my education and knowledge. I saw a small notice in the Gazette about weekly meetings of the Schenectady Photographic Society and that anyone was welcome. I wasn't sure I belonged in the company of such a prestigious group called a "society" but I gave it a try. I felt welcomed right from the start. It took a while before I got the nerve to enter a print into competition. My first entry didn't do well. In fact, the judge declared that it shouldn't even have been entered in competition...something about "no center of interest." Ouch! Well, I still liked that picture anyway. That told me something. I kept entering. Now, some pictures place well and some don't do anything at all. I'm happy with that. I always learn a little more each time from the judges' comments, even though I may not al-



ways agree with them. I am inspired by, and in awe of, all the wonderful, diverse photos that club members enter. I learned early on that this is a group of talented people who are willing and eager to share their knowledge. And, as a bonus, over the years I formed life-long friendships. What could be better!

Fifteen years ago my house burned down. Among the losses were my camera equipment and darkroom. Disaster turned to opportunity when I decided this was the perfect time to enter the digital world. I bought a Nikon D200. I discovered Photoshop. Both were a challenge, but once again I was hooked. Here I was hanging out with a group of creative women. We had always pushed and encouraged each other. Even in the days of film, we embraced every new technique to come down the pike. There were Polaroid transfers, emulsion lifts and manipulations, hand-colored prints, Orton effect slides, Holga cameras, infrared film, and more. Photoshop and its creative options had my name written all over it. I had to try them all. And then came along the plug-ins such as Topaz and NIK. I found myself really attracted to painterly photo renditions. I challenged myself to learn Corel Painter. I operated in the "what if" mind set. There was always one more effect to try. OK, sometimes I over did it and created a mess. I still do.

I now have a hard time producing a "straight" photo. A lot of judges don't go for "enhanced" photos, but that's OK. I always think of a workshop instructor who reminds her students not to make photos just to please the judges but to produce photos that please ourselves. Good advice.

My camera of choice at the moment is a Panasonic Lumix FZ300 bridge camera. It has a built in 24-600mm zoom and a constant F2.8 aperture. It's small and light weight and covers all my needs. Once in a while I get a wild idea that I need a new mirrorless camera or an iPhone, but I get over it when I look at the prices. Maybe some day I'll give in! I'll admit I gave in to another whim this summer. I had my old Lumix FZ200 converted to shoot black and while infrared photos. The IR look blows me away...I'm hooked again! Now I have more IR pictures than I know what to do with, but I'm having fun experimenting.



BEFORE YOU TOSS...TEST!

Sometimes you make a mistake. Everyone does from time to time. You are shooting in a hurry and forget to check your histogram, or you have accidentally changed a setting on your camera and do not realize it until you import much later and see your mistake, or a zillion other reasons.

The bear image below is an example of a mistake I made when photographing brown bears in Alaska. This bear came around a corner silently and suddenly, very close, but not at all threatening. I brought my camera to my eye and clicked off a few shots before she was gone as quickly as she came. THEN I looked at the histogram. Yikes, it was way underexposed.

Many people will immediately delete a mistake from the memory card, but that is the WRONG thing to do for two reasons:

- 1. You should never, ever (did I say NEVER?) delete any images from the memory card when it is in your camera. Memory cards are designed to be a one-way street, and are not happy when you try to throw them into reverse and force them to remove an image in the camera. Just leave the loser images on the card until after you have imported them into your computer. Once you have imported the images, and have made a backup copy of the images as well, you can then put the card back into the camera and reformat the card.
- 2. You never know (did I say NEVER?) whether what appears to be a loser image is salvageable until you try to save it in Lightroom (or other image optimization software you use).

This is the original RAW image.

Somehow (I still don't know how) I managed to underexpose it by about a stopand-a-half. I did not want to trash the image because it was a special moment AND the bear's expression was compelling. While I recommend NEVER using the "Exposure" slider in Lightroom, if you have a significantly underexposed or overexposed image there are times when the Exposure slider will save you. FYI, in the last 9 years of using Lightroom I have used the Exposure slider less than 10 times. Why? Because it changes everything globally, and it is much better to tackle image issues one small step at a time. If you have questions about that, please email me.

Thankfully, Lightroom helped to save this image. Here is the same image after doing a little work in Lightroom.

After increasing Exposure by about a stopand-a-half, the only other changes needed were to move the Shadows slider to +100, move the Whites slider to +20, move the Clarity slider to +30, and move the Noise Reduction slider to +30. The finishing touch was

to use the Brush tool to lighten the eyes a little.

So don't despair until you have tried to save what at first glance might look like a poor image. Often Lightroom might just surprise you and make your day!
