- and lots of determination. If you are Francis X. Driscoll, however, you've also got a full-time job to consider, as well. Decisions, decisions, decisions...

Fran Driscoll, born and raised in the Bronx, New York, is a selftaught photographer. His admiration and love of the "Mountain Top" were the inspiring motives for his pursuit of photography as a hobby. Fran jokes that his photography "is a hobby gotten out of hand". Francis is always on vigil for an elusive shot in our ever-changing mountains. One of the rewards he has as a photographer is sharing the beauty of nature, as he perceives it, with others. Ultimately, Driscoll's images perfectly convey the beauty of the astonishing place known as the Catskill Mountains.

Fran has found 35mm transparency film to be the medium of choice, although he also has 6x7 medium format equipment.

"There's just something so pure, so honest about slide film", says Fran. "You must take extra care about exposure, however - and it doesn't hurt to bracket a bit". But, when a pro-lab produces his 20x enlargements, he knows they can maintain that quality from a well-exposed chrome. Since January, Fran has been delving into digital imaging, utilizing a top-of-the-line D-SLR. Much testing remains to determine just how well this new technology compares to his old stand-bys. However, in the middle of a snowstorm, there is some small comfort knowing that the image is secure on his CF card. Now, if he can only keep those batteries warm...

Winning numerous local photography awards such as the Hunter Promotion Association, the Windham Chamber of Commerce, and the Twilight Park Artist Association has helped to spread word of his talent. Francis has shown his work at the Greene County Council of the Arts Gallery, the Catskill Mountain Foundation, the Pratt Museum and Columbia Memorial Hospital as well as other exhibits. Many of his images have been

published regionally and nationally in magazines, textbooks and travel guides. His work is also part of several corporate collections. Fran conducts workshops, photography hikes and speaking engagements for adults and children. He has served as curator of a show at the Mountain Top Gallery, where he is a committee member. He recently took a thirdplace award from the North American Nature Photographers Association for his snow-bound apple tree image.

Fran is currently in the final stages of





SPS Focus May 2006

Making INSTANT Selections

If the subject of your image is much **brighter or darker** from the rest of your image, you can isolate your subject in just a few quick seconds using the blending sliders in photoshop. A few examples of a bright object with a dark background are: the moon or fireworks against a dark night sky. An opposite example would be an image with dark birds silhouetted against a bright sky.

The first step is to access the blending sliders under the blending options. Click on Layer: Layer Style: Blending Options. OR: You can double click in the empty area to the right of the active layer's name. I usually activate the background layer that I have unlocked.

When you bring up the Blending Options dialog page, go to the bottom of the page where you see Blend If sliders labeled "This Layer" This slider is going to remove everything from your image except the bright or dark object that you want to keep or select.

If the subject is brighter than the background as in a photo of the moon with the dark sky as the background, move the sliders on the left of "this layer" to the right until the background disappears. Keep your eye on your image. It's like magic! The background disappears in a few seconds. To control the edge quality of the selection, now hold the Alt. key and pull. The sliders will split. Pull on the left edge of the slider to produce a "softer edge" on your selection.

In my bird silhouette example, the sky is very bright, and the birds are very dark. I want to keep the dark birds and hide the sky. This time I move the sliders on the right toward the left to make the background sky disappear. It happens very quickly. Don't worry if some part of the background is left over. The eraser tool will remove it very easily. Voila! You have a perfect selection ready to move into another image.

BUT not so fast!...So far you have only hidden the background.

You have to perform a few more steps if you want to make the selection permanent. Control click the New Layer icon at the bottom of the Layers palette. Put this empty layer below the one that you applied the sliders to. In my case it would be the background layer.

Click on the upper layer now to make it active. Then click on Layer: Merge Down or Flatten, and the two layers will merge together. Your selection is now permanent...and ready to use over and over.



In the original photo: A young man was shooting the pelicans in the sky with his digital camera, but my photo only caught one blurry bird.

I shot a second image of some pelicans with the bright sky as the background. Using the blending sliders, I removed all of the background to make a perfect selection of the birds.

I have now moved the selected birds into the original photo, and the picture now looks as I intended.

Winner's Notes:

- *Jane shot the meadowlark outside of Orlando last spring from the car. She used a Nikon D100 and an 80-300 lens which is about 450 on a digital camera. She thought a butterfly on his foot would be amusing so she added one, using Psp CS2.
- **Michelle, a new member this year, entered for the first time and produced the winning photo which she took with a Canon Digital rebel XT and a Tamron 70-300 zoom. It was recess at a school playground.
- ***Kevin took this photo with a Leica M5, a 50mm Summicron lens and Tri X film. He write "while strolling the city of Beaufort, S.C. with his wife, he spotted a local church undergoing extensive repair.. The roofing was supported at odd angles by numerous pieces of lumber. The Reverend Johnson wandered by and provided them with an exhaustive history of his church, which dated from the Civil War. He was so proud of the renovations that I just had to document them with him beaming alongside. The extreme contrast between Reverand Johnson's complexion and the white church certainly challenged the dynamic range of the film. However, careful exposure and attention during processing yeilded a negative that could be easily printd or scanned. The dynamic expression of the Reverand just made this picture.

Program Phillip Caruso / Still Photography on the Hollywood Set

Winner's Notes:

- *Kevin took this with a Leica R3, a Leitz 35mm Elmarit R lens and Fuji Provia 100 film. This image resulted from a series made while testing the lens. Kevin said "typically, I run through the series of apertures on a number of different subjects, and while searching for a mid-test snack, I came upon the eggs in the refrigerator. Setting them up on a piece of white posterboard on the back porch, the still-life was in deep shadow which contributed to the blue cast to the image. The fact that I broke one egg while constructing the still-life only made the image more interesting."
- ** Howie took this in Maine with a Nikon N90s and a 28-70mm 3.5-4.5 zoom lens, using Fuji 100 ISO film on a tripod at f22and the shutter speed was probably about 1/2 second. The metering was spotted on the sky, the redish portion. He write "sometimes the reults you get are surprising. The sky and rocks did not look as dramatic as I wanted when I took the image but the resulting tones turned out to be pleasing and an accurate recording of the evening light. The posture of the couple captured in the photo conveyed their shared wonder of the magic of the fading light over the sky and sea."

Ken Deitcher has been busy


