President's Message

Bob Gough May, 2007 Founded in 1931, the Schenectady Photographic Society this year celebrates it's 75th year as an organization. For three quarters of a century, SPS has inspired local photographers to learn about photography and to create better work. Since its inception, SPS has existed to provide area photographers, professional and amateur alike, with a forum in which we can discuss photographic techniques, the aesthetics of photographic images and the nature of photography as a tool, a craft and an art form. It has given us the opportunity to show our work to others and to view their work so that we all might learn from the experience and grow as photographers. It allows us to socialize with other people with a common interest and many of its members have formed life long friendships.

Kick-off meeting Wednesday, September 19th

Photography has come quite a long way in the years since SPS was founded. Two cameras of choice in those days were the Kodak Brownie for snap shooting and the Leica I, the first high quality 35mm camera, for more serious shooters. In 1931 flashbulbs were cutting edge technology, replacing flash powder as a more reliable and less dangerous light source for low light photography. Kodachrome was still another five years away and Kodak color print film was another ten, so at that time color photography for everyday picture takers was still a thing of the future. 35mm SLR cameras would not come into widespread use for at least another ten years and Poloroid cameras would not be invented for another seventeen years.

In 1931 many of the photographers whom we now consider to be the great old masters of photographic art had yet to create the majority of their work. Edward Weston, Ansel Adams, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Minor White, Harry Callahan, Irving Penn, Margaret Bourke-White and Gary Winogrand are but a few of the many talented photographers who began their careers in the early half of the last century, creating photographs of timeless beauty that have inspired us all over the years.

Recently, developments in photographic technology have added many new words and phrases to our lexicon. In 1931 an image file was a manila folder with a bunch of prints in it and flash cards were something used to teach kids math. Photoshop was the place you went to buy your film and to have it developed. Digital manipulation meant fiddling with something with your fingers and depending on what you were fiddling with you may not have wanted to talk about it in mixed company.

This year we have enjoyed a number of interesting programs, from our kick-off speaker, Shelby Lee Adams to talks by noted local photographers as Mark McCarty, Leif Zurmuhlen, Lawrence White and others. We had a number of wonderful presentations by some of our members: Max Tiller, Jeff Perkins, Ray Hull, Connie Frisbee-Houde, Frank Bumbardatore, Linda Heim and Robert Near gave talks as well as an excellent series of lectures by Jim Craner on the use of Photoshop to edit digital images. Also this year we experimented with a new form of competition, that of digital image projection and I look forward to seeing this expanded and developed in the years to come.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the members of the board of directors, a group of dedicated individuals who work tirelessly, volunteering their time to ensure that there are engaging programs presented each and every Wednesday evening. In particular I would like to thank Vice President Kevin Sarsfield for being an excellent right-hand man and making my job that much easier. Finally I would like to thank all of you, the members of SPS for making the society the vibrant and vital organization that it is today. It has been my pleasure and my privilege to serve this year as president of the Schenectady Photographic Society.







November	Unusual Angle	Study your subject from a different angle, get low, get high, get crazy	
December	Repetition	Show repetition, be it man made or natural	
January	City Life	Convey city life within your image	
February	Up-close	Get in tight with your subject, look for inner beauty	
March	Architectural Detail	Select out the architectural beauty in the details	
April	Age	Convey age in your photos

**January	The Color Red	May include other colors, but red objects or light must predominate
*February	Metallica	Metal objects or surfaces, rust, etc
**March	Running Water	Waterfalls, streams, etc
*April	Sunrise, sunset re-imagined	New, original or creative takes on an old standard

Note: Images for assigned competition must be taken after May 1, 2007

*October, December, February and April will be digitally projected images.

**November, January, March will be slides.




