ebruary Projected **Image Group** speaker: Brian Plant by Jeff Plant

Our speaker for the February Projected Images meeting will be Brian Plant of Hummelstown, PA. Brian previously gave a program at SPS about 3 years ago and spoke on one of his specialties - night photography.

Brian is a nationally known photographer of railroad subjects, and has had his work published in national railroad periodicals and in several books on the subject.

He got an early start as a photographer under the guidance of his father, Jeremy Plant, who gave a program at SPS last year. By the time he was a teenager, Brian had already had photos published in national railroad magazines.

Brian studied photography at Ithaca College and works largely in digital imaging. He travels extensively to document historic diesel locomotives, and oper-

ating preserved steam power. He attempts to give unique and artistic treatment to railroad subjects. Some of his most effective photos are of colored railroad signals at night. He is also fond of using fog and mist to give interesting effect often in combination with the lights and action of rail-Iroads.

Brian will present a program on using the digital camera to create artistic effect at night and under interesting atmosphere and light conditions. He will use both digitally projected images and prints to demonstrate his approach to his photography.

Digital Night: Jeff Perkins – Exploring Photoshop Blend Modes

Blend Modes is one of the least understood, and most underutilized features in Adobe Photoshop. The eyes of even some well-known PS professionals glaze over when trying to explain their use in everyday image editing. Often the information is much too theoretical in nature. Lacking the inspiration of good examples, many image makers completely abandon blend modes as a tool.

Jeff Perkins has mastered blend modes, and has used them to good advantage restoring old photos, and creating new ones. Jeff's approach to teaching blend modes is to skip the theory and concentrate on good practical methodology. In past presentations, Jeff has shown us how to use blend modes to enhance color and tonality both locally and globally in an image. This year, Jeff is certain to reveal a few more of his secrets.

Here's a method of dodging and burning that is based on Jeff's techniques. It uses a blend mode, layer

opacity, and the paint brush tool to give you complete control over local tonal adjustments in an image.

First, make all other image adjustments necessary (crop, tone, color, etc.). Next, create an empty layer at the top of the layers stack, and change the blend mode of this newly created layer to 'Soft Light'. Select the 'Brush' tool, and create a soft-edge brush of appropriate size (this will be your dodge and burn tool). Using the brush, 'paint' on the newly created layer with 'white paint' to lighten the area of the image under the brush, and paint with 'black paint' to darken. You can reverse paint colors to undo/redo while you fine tune your work. When done the overall effect of the dodging and burning can be further adjusted by adjusting the opacity of the layer on which the dodging and burning was done.





Where Art Meets Science - The Illuminated


Veil

On February 25, the Fine Arts Group will present Chris Bjornsson, Microscopy Core Director of the Biotechnology Center at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy. Chris's "Illuminated Veil" is a series of large-scale microscopic images portraying the raw imagery of his research and was exhibited as part of the BioArt Program at RPI, in an effort to create mutually supportive and critically engaged dialog between art, engineering and science. Chris received his Ph.D. in Zoology at the University of Manitoba studying insect oogenesis, then moved to the Wadsworth Center in Albany before coming to RPI. His research has always been geared towards creating images as an end product, a habit which has necessitated collaborating with image analysis experts to derive quantitative information for a community in which qualitative observations are increasingly undervalued.

During his postdoctoral work Chris began to explore the brain, and to develop ways to image thick slabs of tissue labeled to reveal as many cells as possible. Using spectral confocal microscopy, images can be obtained that uncover the complex 3dimensional associations of neurons, glia and vasculature. When these images are analyzed by his colleagues at RPI, transforming the raw images into digitized representations of the cells and vessels that comprise the brain, the complex interactions among these cells can begin to be untangled, generating comprehensive, quantitative maps of brain architecture.

Chris' images demonstrate the power of fluorescent labeling and confocal microscopy, and hint at the future potential for whole-brain mapping in an effort to lift the veil that obscures our understanding of brain structure and function. This presentation will discuss the process involved in generating multidimensional images using advanced microscopy techniques and their value in art and science. Chris comes from an artistic family; his brother Geoff is a sculpture and ceramic artist, while his sister Birgitta works with different mediums: photography, film, sculpture, installation, drawing and architecture.


