#### Linda J Ford to speak on Wildflowers of Mexico's Copper Canyon Region on October 21

Have you ever been to a region of the world and you are looking to get more information on that region, but there is no info or book on what you are looking for. This is exactly what our October 21<sup>st</sup> speaker ran into, which inspired Linda Ford to do her own book.

Linda first visited the Copper Canyon region with her husband Phil in the Fall of 2004. She was immediately enthralled by the abundance of wildflowers during her autumn visit. She wanted to know more. Upon further investigation, she found that although there were books about the area's birds and trees and wildlife, there was no guide for the wildflowers of the region. Linda, a Master Gardener in her home state of New York, decided that it was time to make one!

Mexico's Copper Canyon region is a vast area of land primarily located in the state of Chihuahua. The Copper Canyon region covers a large part of southwestern Chihuahua and also extends into the states of Durango, Sinaloa and Sonora. It is best to think of Copper Canyon as a complex labyrinth of inhabited canyons and valleys. In total, the network of canyons covers five times more land area than the USA's Grand Canyon. It is truly a sight to experience.

Linda returned to the Copper Canyon region in the fall of 2005 to start the project. Hosted by the generous and ever-encouraging Doug "Diego" Rhodes at the Hotel Paraiso del Oso in Cerocahui, Chihuahua, Linda set out on her mission. The first autumn was a great success as Linda found and documented over 40 wildflowers in the area. Then Linda returned to the region again in 2006 and 2007 and was joined by Ryan J. Hawkins, who assisted her as a field technician, found trails to explore, and navigated the rural roadways of Mexico. The total number of wildflowers that were documented and photographed was 140.

During her time in the canyons, she utilized the expertise of local guides to further her experience and also to learn some of the local names of the plants.



The research had been compiled, and it was time to start on the book. Since her return from Mexico, Linda has persistently worked on the book. She has worked with Daniel Atha, botanist from the New York Botanical Garden, to identify the plants she documented.

Linda is thrilled that her dream is coming to fruition, as this has been her main post-retirement focus. Ms. Ford is excited to be able to share the beauty and splendor of this spectacular region of the world through the publication of this book and to raise awareness of this natural resource and encourage the preservation of the wildflowers.

### Getting out of the comfort zone

Sometimes we find ourselves in a groove, doing the same things over and over again. When that happens, your work stagnates and it ceases to excite you. How do you break out of this rut? Try something different, for a change – try something you would never, otherwise do. Yes, you know it will not work, but you are not trying to get a great image today. Today you are out to have fun, to go crazy! One idea is to keep your zoom lens on 50mm and take shots by, heaven forbid, moving around! This gets you to focus less on equipment and more on what you are really trying to capture. A few years ago I attended a workshop by Ernestine Ruben. She made us do a number of exercises to get us out of our respective comfort zones and create images of a kind we'd never tried before. She gave us an entire checklist of things to try. A couple of ideas I remember (since I found them especially "painful"): shoot between your legs; shoot without looking through the viewfinder; shoot while swiveling around. Robert Glenn Ketchum told me of an occasion when he was teaching a workshop at Santa Fe and all his students were getting the usual kind of Santa Fe images and feeling quite self-contented. So he took the class to a freeway median and forced them to shoot the entire half-day there without getting off the median AND to use ALL the lenses they'd been lugging around in their bags before he'd let them go!

In art, as in science, experimentation is everything, it is the *raison d'etre*. When we get so comfortable that we stop experimenting, our work starts getting stale. The difference is that while scientific creativity is bound by the laws of nature, artistic creativity is bound only by our imagination; photography is somewhere in between, since the physical devices we use are limited by optics and electronics (or chemistry for those of us still practicing that craft!)

So try something wild today... and let us know on the blog how it works out! - Sukumar


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## Wildflowers of Mexico's Copper Canyon

#### **Welcome to Competition Nights 2009-2010**

I hope everyone has been busy this summer, photographically that is. For those of you who don't know me, my name is Sean Sullivan. I am, along with Doug Mitchell, the 2009-2010 Print Group Co-Chair. We hope that between the two of us the upcoming season will be a fun and exciting one. Doug and I want to give Bob Near and Bob Warner a big thank you for the job they did last year as the group co-chairs.

Along with new co-chairs, there are some important changes to Print Night competition rules for the upcoming season. The new rules have been discussed in detail and we feel that they should make the competitions fairer for all who enter, and to run a little smoother. One of the biggest changes pertains to the number of prints that may be entered in each category.

Members will be limited to entering one print per category on Print Night for up to a total of 3 submissions. This is to help limit the number of entries the judges need to review, as well as allow more time for comments and critiques during the presentation. It hopefully will push the members to be more critical of your own work and submit your best work. This should also help open up more chances for other members to have a print receive a place or honorable mention. In addition, there is no longer any requirement to enter the Monochrome category. For projected nights, the limits are two slides and/or two digital images.

There is a small change to the Print of the Year competition as well. The number of entries for Print of the Year will be limited to two prints, and only one per category. This to help limit the total number of prints and shorten the long night of presentation.

Also this year we will be strictly enforcing the rules pertaining to who can enter the competitions. Remember, to enter the competitions, you MUST have your dues paid by the night of the competition or your entry will be disqualified.

We will be discussing these changes at our first Print Night on October 7th. Also, on the agenda for the 7th will be our 2008-2009 Print of the Year winners. Bob Near and David Jeffery will be bringing in their winning prints to talk about the creative process behind them and answer any questions.

As a reminder, the October Print Assigned Topic is "Interior". So get out those architectural shots and Doug and I will see you on the  $7^{th}$  of October. The projected topic on October  $14^{th}$  is "Summer".

## **Fall Field Trip to Milbrook Winery**

Our first field trip of the year has been scheduled for Saturday, October 3<sup>rd</sup> to beautiful Milbrook Winery. This New York winery has been called "the Hudson Valley's flagship winery" by The New York Times and is a gorgeous place to do some fall photography.

For this trip, we will need to arrange some car pooling and I will be looking for volunteer drivers. Millbrook is about an hour and a half south of Albany on the Taconic State Parkway. The area is surrounded by smaller vineyards, rolling hills, and lots of rural beauty.
