**2010 Kick-off meeting to feature David Middleton on Wed. Sept. 22<sup>nd</sup>**

Schenectady Photographic Society will kick-off the 2010-2011 year by featuring Photographer David Middleton. The event is free of charge and open to the public. David Middleton is a full-time professional outdoor photographer and writer. During his 25-year career, he has photographed for and written ten books. His first, *Ancient Forests*, was published in 1992 and was followed by *The Nature of America* – which he created, co-directed, wrote and contributed photographs for – was the largest nature photography book project ever undertaken. His recent books include *The Nature of Vermont*, *A Photographer's Guide to Vermont*, *A Photographer's Guide to the Maine Coast* and *A Photographers Guide to the Oregon Coast*.

Middleton is a Contributing Editor of *Outdoor Photographer Magazine*, a Nikon Legend Behind the Lens, and the Executive Director of the Photographers Alliance Workshops Company. Middleton now lives on a former dairy farm in southwestern Vermont, not

far from the farm featured in his book: *Quite a Sightly Place: A Family Dairy in Vermont*.

David will be presenting a behind the scenes look at his most recent book project – *Quite a Sightly Place* – the story of a traditional New England farm. David will explain how he found this remarkable farm and how the book project evolved from a few calendar pictures to a book full of stories and images. Along the way he might even share a story or three about the farm. Most importantly, David will show the great benefits of concentrating your photography on one theme, to get your best pictures and find images that are unique and compelling.

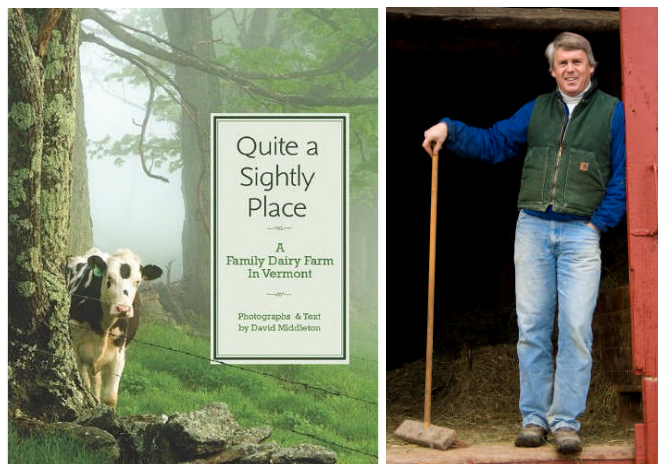

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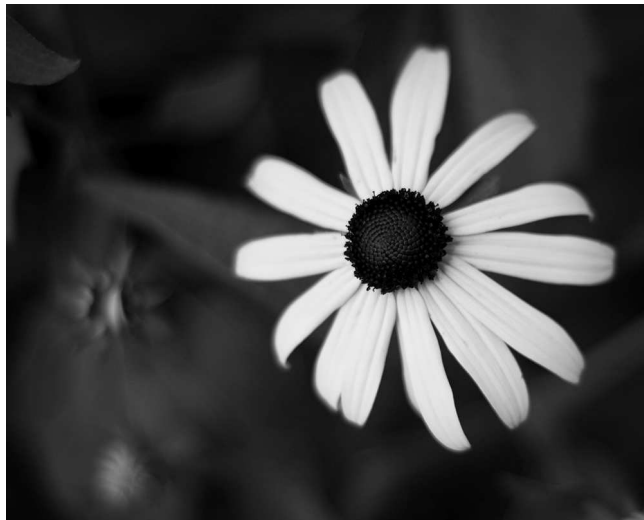

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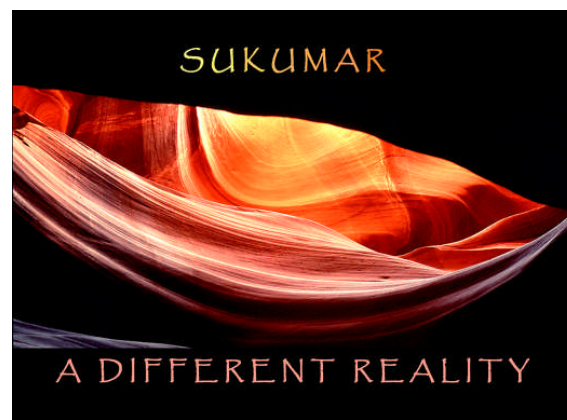

### Canon Powershot G11

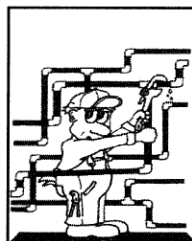

The Canon Powershot G series has long been regarded as the ideal compact camera for photography enthusiasts who desire the image quality and versatility of a SLR but without the added size and weight. The Canon Powershot G11 is the successor of the G10. Although the two look very similar in physical appearance and share a few core specifications, both cameras feature the same image stabilized 5x zoom lens, RAW image capture, optical viewfinder, external hot shoe, and full manual exposure control. Canon specifically set out with the G11 to improve the camera's low light sensitivity and overall image quality.



Even though the new G11 shares the same 1/1.7" size sensor as its predecessor, its resolution has been reduced from 14.7 megapixels to 10 megapixels. This enables the G11 to produce cleaner images and reduces digital noise commonly exhibited when shooting in low-light situations at higher ISO's. The G11 also features an expanded ISO range topping out at 3200 ISO, which is a full stop higher than the previous model's.

Just like the previous G series cameras, the new G11 is built exceptionally well. The sturdy, all metal body is well balanced and is fitted with a rubberized handgrip.



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On the top of the camera, in addition to the power and shutter buttons, there are three manual dials to control mode selection, ISO and exposure compensation. These are very handy and allow you to quickly change critical settings. Another nice improvement can be found on the rear of the camera. With the addition of a fully articulating 2.8-inch rear LCD screen, Canon has re-introduced a much-appreciated feature absent since the G6. The adjustable screen allows you to easily frame your photo in low or high angle situations, which can make it much easier to get creative with your composition.

The G11 offers an impressive range of features and includes manual controls that are typically unavailable in the point and shoot market. The improved low light performance coupled with the versatile LCD screen make the G11 a very attractive option for someone looking for a full featured compact camera. The G11 kit currently sells for \$479 and includes a rechargeable lithium battery, charger, neck strap, USB/AV cables and the Canon Digital Camera Solutions software.
