Breaking Surface Recent Work by Linda Morrell


Professor of Photography, Sage College of Albany

Breaking Surface presents a continuing group of imagery in which my focus has shifted beyond representational subject matter to observation of the inherent qualities of surface and the contradiction between the reality of the flat visual plane and perceived depth. The dichotomy between surfaces in certain found subjects presents itself readily allowing me to create a subtle shift in spatial illusion. Within other images however, I have introduced opposing textures and forms that are evident, breaking the surface to create new space within the picture plane. This indeterminate space becomes the main subject of the photograph.

Within this group of work I investigate the subject of the photograph as content through an exploration of surface quality and its subsequent interruption and reorganization. Building upon texture, form, and progressive rhythm, I consider spatial illusion of the visual plane. These photographs will be on exhibit in a Solo show at the University of Redlands in Redland California from March 15-April 17, 2011.

Bio: Artist, Linda Morrell, a native of Albany, New York, has worked in photography for the past twenty-eight years. She received her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the Rhode Island School of Design, studying with noted photographer Harry Callahan. Her Master of Fine Arts degree is from George Washington University. Living in the Washington D.C. area from 1978 to 1984, she taught at George Washington University, American University, Trinity College and the Smithsonian Institution.

From 1985 to the present she has been on the faculty of the Sage College of Albany. Currently she is a Professor and since 1985 has been the program coordinator for photography. From 1987 until 1989 she also served as Chairperson of the Visual Arts Department. In the Spring of 2007, she was a Visiting Professor of Photography for the University of Georgia Studies Abroad Program in Cortona, Italy. Linda Morrell's work has been acquired by permanent collections, among them The Museum of Contemporary Photography in Chicago and the Munson-Williams-Proctor Institute in Utica, NY. She has had more than 40 exhibitions of her work both nationally and internationally. She has published articles on her subject in regional and national publications.

Max Tiller presents "Flash Advantages" on Print Night April 6th

Max Tiller will talk about the use of flash in image making. Many photographers shy away from using flash because they do not use it properly and are not familiar with the way flash is used on camera. They are

not aware of the various attachments and how they are used produce an effective image. When there adequate or available light, the right kind of flash illumination can make a very effective



photograph. Max will show images made with various attachments and also images made with the use of more than one flash.

The photo above of the dog named Pip was taken with a Sony DSLR A200 mounted on a Stroboframe with a Minolta D Flash Mounted on top of the Stroboframe. The photo below at a Mardi Gras celebration was taken with a Fuji F20 point and shoot camera using the small built in flash. The camera was held up high to give top front lighting.

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Competition April 27th

The SPS Photo Essay competition will be held the evening of April 27th. This is always an enjoyable and relaxing competition and the number of participants has grown dramatically over the years, as the mechanics of preparing an essay have become simpler.

The big news this year is the formal recognition of a new format – the photo book.

As in previous years, the club will provide a digital projector and a Windows notebook computer. Participants are responsible to bring their projected essay on 'thumb drive' or CD (DVD should not be used). If using ProShow™ it is best to output the essay as an 'executable file' for playback on a Windows system. Essays prepared on a Macintosh™ are best prepared as a QuickTime movie. Participants are welcome to present using their own computers.

To insure a smooth presentation – especially if you are entering for the first time – participants are encouraged to bring the finished essay the week before for a trial run. Jim Craner will bring his notebook computer to all the April meetings and will be happy to help you test your show.

For assistance in preparing an essay, Windows users can consult with Jim Craner or Rob Near; Apple Macintosh users can get some help from Connie Frisbee Houde.

Community Service Going to the Dogs

Presented by Barb Lawton and Jack Hurley on April 13



Barb and Jack have been active members of SPS for a number of years, Barb for 19 years and Jack 6 years. They both credit SPS as their inspiration for continuing their quest to improve their photography and to seek challenges that will keep their visual creations fresh and interesting.

Their photographic interests are not limited and include anything from landscapes to photojournalism, travel and family gatherings. They keep their eyes peeled for subjects that might just happen to appear out of nowhere, always carrying a point-and-shoot camera in their pocket just in case.

An ongoing volunteer project for Jack and Barb is documenting the activities of an organization called NEADS, which stands for "National Education For Assistance Dog Services." This organization is located in Princeton, MA and has been in service since 1976. Its mission is to train and provide assistance dogs to people who are deaf, physically, or emotionally disabled. Lately many clients are combat veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan with severe disabilities and trauma. These dogs become an extension of their owners by bringing them security, freedom, independence, and relief from social isolation.

Barb and Jack travel to Princeton at least once a month to spend a few days with the trainers, service dogs and their new owners, and take pictures while they participate in an intensive two-week training session. The photographs they take are used by NEADS in promotional materials, slide show presentations, and other visual aides. Jack and Barb provide each client with a CD of all the pictures they take of the training process as a reminder of their time getting to know their new canine partners.

Jack and Barb will show some images of their experiences at NEADS and will explain why they volunteer their time and services to this important organization. In doing so they hope to inspire other members of SPS to volunteer their time as photographers to other community organizations who might benefit from having photos of their activities. Jack and Barb feel it is a very rewarding and appreciated experience.









The Puffin Pad

Jonathan Lawton Hunts Photo & Video



The Puffin Pad is a window mounted camera support designed to slip over an open car window to allow you to stabilize your camera while shooting. The majority of the Puffin Pad is comprised of closed-cell automotive foam, making it very light weight. The bottom of the pad is cut out in a semi-circle to allow you to mount it over most cylindrical surfaces. The top portion of the pad is covered with a layer of soft memory foam. The memory foam is a great feature, as it easily contours to the shape of your camera or lens to keep it in place.

The Puffin Pad may have a funny name, but it is serious about supporting your camera in a number of situations. You can get creative and use the Puffin Pad to steady your camera over a fence post, car hood or even on the ground. Because the unit is made of foam, the Puffin Pad is ultra light weight, weighing in at less than 4 ounces. Its dimensions of 7" x 5" x 5" makes the Puffin Pad a convenient tripod replacement for the spur-of-the-moment photo shoot.

It can be used to steady all types of camera and lens combinations, from small digital SLR's to heavy super telephoto lenses. The Puffin Pad is an inexpensive and versatile tool to help you stabilize your camera and capture tack-sharp images. The Puffin Pad sells for \$29.99.
