Some Kind of Photography

Photographs appear to me in pieces. When I attempt to consider a singular image that I have seen on a given day, I am left with a mix of visual information that amounts to static. I am interested in quieting and containing this static. I dissect photographs to extract their important parts. These are remixed and reorganized into works that conceptually describe the abundance of imagery in the world, or for purely aesthetic reasons.

I believe that photographic images are constructed the same way that buildings are built. Time, light, and forms are structured within a space with honest precision. I apply this thinking to my work. My photographs and photographic processes are abstracted to explore the dimensionality of images that extend off of the wall and into the viewing space. When delicately combined with other materials, like wood, thread, pins and vellum, image is both seen and unseen.

I came to this way of thinking about photographic images fairly early in my artistic pursuits, but have only now begun to refine this through physical pieces. During my talk I will present images of my work to show the progression and exploration that maintains the balance between my ideas about images and sculptural forms.



Melinda McDaniel Bio: received a B.F.A. in Studio Art from Florida State University. Tallahassee. and M.F.A. an Photography from Ohio University, State Columbus. Her work has been exhibited in a solo exhibition at Carrie Haddad Photographs in Hudson, NY, as well as group exhibitions at The Museum of Contemporary Photography in Chicago, the University at Albany Art Museum, the Opalka Gallery at Russell Sage College, and The Arts

Center of the Capital Region in Troy, NY.

Nikon Coolpix P7000

Jonathan Lawton Hunts Photo & Video



For Nikon, the P-Series designation is reserved for their highest quality and most technically advanced compact digital cameras. The Nikon P7000 is the flagship of the Coolpix camera lineup and was specifically designed to satisfy the needs of the serious amateur and professional alike. By combining the features of an SLR with the form factor of a point and shoot, Nikon has created quite an impressive pocket camera.

The Nikon P7000 replaces the year and a half old P6000. Typically new models are released with subtle upgrades and minor improvements over their predecessors, however the P7000 breaks that trend as pretty much the entire camera was redesigned from the ground up. The overall shape of the camera changed and is now made of metal, while the key control switches are now located in areas where your hands naturally grip the body. The camera still features a large format 1/1.7" CCD sensor. However, in order to increase low-light sensitivity, the resolution was to a reasonable 10.1 reduced megapixels. A noteworthy improvement was made to the camera's lens. The P7000 now sports an image-stabilized 7.1x optical zoom (28-300mm 35mm equivalent) This versatile lens distinguishes the P7000 with the longest zoom lens in its class. On the back of the camera, the 921,000 dot LCD screen grew to 3 inches allowing easy image composition and playback. Fortunately Nikon has also included an adjustable optical viewfinder that is rather helpful when shooting outdoors.

One attribute that sets the P7000 apart from nearly every other compact camera is the ability to shoot in full manual mode. Being able to select the aperture and shutter speed combination you want allows much greater creative control. In addition to the standard JPEG picture file, the P7000 also supports the uncompressed RAW image format. ISO settings can also be selected manually and range from ISO100-

6400. Other notable upgrades include 720p HD video mode with stereo sound as well as a built-in virtual horizon that helps ensure your photos are level. Operating the P7000 is very straightforward. You can quickly adjust important settings like ISO, white balance, picture quality, exposure compensation, and the shooting mode with just the thumb wheels on the top of the camera.

With its compact size and impressive feature-set, the P7000 has definitely earned its place at the top of Nikon's Coolpix lineup. If you are interested in a travel friendly compact camera but still crave the creative control of SLR, the P7000 is a great alternative. The P7000 kit includes: one rechargeable Li-Ion batter, charger, USB and AV cable, neck strap, and the Nikon software suite CD-ROM. The P700 currently sells for \$449.95.

When doing an assignment like this you are not shooting to achieve your vision of how the layout should look, but rather to be sure the art director can achieve his/her vision for the article. Naturally, you have to deliver all the required shots, and art directors like to have multiple options for each situation. Beyond that, bringing back something different is always appreciated. Above all, delivering high quality work, on time, leaves a good impression, which may lead to additional opportunities. In this short program, Jim will share more details about this assignment including:

- the required shot list,
- contract terms, including image rights,
- a representative sampling of the shots submitted,
- a few of the technical challenges, and
- the final layout of the article.

Photographed a rainy morning at a cemetery outside Canajoharie with a Nikon D300, Nikon 18-200 mm. lens and circular polarizer @ F/20, 1.6 sec. ISO: 200, on a tripod. She used Nik Silver Efex 2 to convert to B&W.

Tulip in the Rain

Those photographers who stay indoors during rain are really missing an opportunity for outdoor image making. There are plastic bags and designed waterproof camera covers to protect your equipment as well as rain gear for you. I took this image in Albany's Washington Park during moderate rainfall. The technique used for this was a DSLR Maxxum 7D with a Minolta 2.8 70-200 lens, ISO 800, F2.8, and Tv of 1/300 sec. Shot in RAW/JPEG with WB set to Cloudy +1.

There are many ways to shoot flowers and unless you are creative, seeking great light and experiment with composition, depth of field, and so forth, you risk your flower photos looking like those of everyone else. To get this narrow DOF, a SLR is required. Compact Point and Shoot cameras can't accomplish this. I chose f2.8 for a shallow depth of field to throw the competing leaf background out of focus. The image was "developed" in Topaz Adjust to create a little more contrast and definition.
