My work exists at an intersection between art and science. With childlike curiosity, I examine the world with the determination of an explorer and the eye of a scientist, studying and recording my wanderings.

I seek out strange, luminal spaces devoid of their inhabitants, but not without evidence of their presence. From strange, remote architectural structures, to sites of construction, and also areas of decay, I investigate those areas on the periphery of our daily awareness.


A solo explorer in the solitude of night, I photograph as a collector of raw materials; shadows, light, textures and colors. From these, I sculpt the scene according to my imagination and present the results as printed images.

On Wed. April 18, Beau will be presenting and discussing his current work, but also talking about and showing images that led to it – a bit of his photographic journey.

BIO: Beau Comeaux grew up in Baton Rouge, Louisiana as an only child with a vivid imagination and a penchant for exploration. He received his BFA from Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge and his MFA from the University of North Texas in Denton. Photographing at night for over twelve years, his work has been shown across the world in places like Saratov, Russia and Pingyao, China. Comeaux was included in the book, Night and Low Light Photography by Jill Waterman published by Amphoto Books, New York 2008. Now living and teaching in upstate New York, he continues to explore and photograph the world during his nocturnal wanderings.

# Back to school: learning to become more effective visual communicators

A presentation by Media Arts educator Stephen Honicki and students from his Advanced Photography class at Niskayuna High School

How has the cost of maintaining a "wet" darkroom and the advent (and affordability) of the digital SLR camera affected photography education in our schools? With cameras accessible in so many different formats to teenagers today, why is the "instruction" of fine art photography so crucial?


Mr. Honicki will share some of the approaches and techniques he utilizes in his classroom environment to help students become more effective visual communicators. In addition, the presentation will explore the importance of developing creative and technical problem-solving skills in students as they begin the process of becoming independent life-long learners.

On Wed. April 4, students will share and discuss their work created in Mr. Honicki's Advanced Photography class. Some examples of these students' work can be seen on page 8.

BIO: Stephen Honicki received his BA in Fine Art from State University of New York at Albany and his MS in Art Education from the College of Saint Rose. He has currently teaches the introductory level as well as the advanced level course in Studio in Video and Photography at Niskayuna High School. In addition to working with students in the classroom environment, Mr. Honicki is the co-advisor of the Nisk-Art Gallery – an in-house teaching gallery that provides students the opportunity to learn and take part in the operation of a professional art gallery.

During his tenure, Mr. Honicki's students have received numerous accolades and awards for their work in numerous art exhibitions and film festivals at the regional, national, and international level.

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# Deb Baldwin: The Creative Self - Personal Happiness Through Self Expression

Deb Baldwin received her B.A. in Psychology from the State University of New York, Albany. She has always had a love of photography as an art form and has been utilizing this medium as a form of self-expression since primary school. With a minor in Fine Art, Deb has come to find her voice through continued exploration.

Deb began working traditionally by creating "normal" size prints. She has evolved into working with digital techniques and experimenting with how the use of scale can be a tool in helping people express themselves. As a result, some of her recent work is life size. Deb also enjoys traditional processing using alternative cameras, including pinhole and Holga varieties.

Deb's work was featured in an exhibition last spring, at the 33<sup>rd</sup> Photo Regional Show at the Albany Center Gallery. This first experience of exhibiting her images publicly and professionally was exhilarating, as she was the recipient of one of three First Prize Awards. Deb is currently working as an auctioneer and administrator at Stair Galleries in Hudson, NY. It is with great enthusiasm that she continues her creative journey.

In addition, over the past several years, Mr. Honicki, and Ruth Hall-Daly, coordinator of the Viewpoint Gallery and Studio in Arts Project at Sunnyview Hospital received Community Art\$ Grants from the Arts Center of the Capital Region for collaborative projects involving photography and video students from Niskayuna High School and adult art students from Sunnyview Hospital's Studio in Arts project.

In addition to his teaching duties, Stephen has had photographs from several of his personal narrative series exhibited as part of the "30th Annual Photography Regional" at the Albany Center Galleries as well at the last four "Exhibition By Artists Of The Mohawk-Hudson Regional" held at the Albany Institute of History & Art, the University Art Museum at SUNYA, and the Hyde Collection in Glens Fallsjust to name a few. In addition, a solo exhibition of selections from his various series was on display at "Magnet" in San Francisco during the month of August 2008 and July 2011. His most recent work was exhibited as part of the international juried exhibit, "It's a Thin Line Between Love and Hate", at the United Photo Industries in Brooklyn.

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







**Spring Fashion** (3<sup>rd</sup> place General): P&S Olympus C7000. State Education Building was shot at noon in May 2005 with spring blooms on the trees. Model was photographed in July 2010 at the NECCC convention in Amherst, MA. **Luba Ricket** first flipped the State Education Building, then turned it sideways (flowers were on top in original flip). Then selected only the model's body parts and moved them into the flipped building. Positioned the model till it was appealing to her. **Serene Shell Seeker** (2<sup>nd</sup> place Assigned) photographed with a Nikon D80 and Tamron 18-250 lens @ f/11, 1/500 sec. ISO: 200. Had to straighten the horizon line & used Shadow & Highlight to get more detail in the foreground. Also used some Topaz Adjust filters to punch up the water colors.
