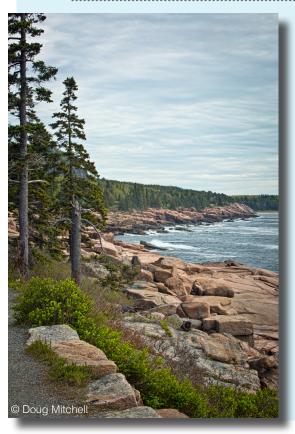


Photo excursions can be fun to plan and a good way to expand your photo skills and portfolio. It's also an opportunity to visit and explore places you haven't been to before. Whether you plan a simple day trip, a long weekend, or a mini vacation you'll gain experience using your equipment and get a variety of new photos for your portfolio.

Advance planning and preparation for your trip will help optimize your travel and get the most out of your shooting time. This can easily be done though research and referring to informational resources like magazine articles, books and the Internet. These are great sources to turn to for information, tips, photo ideas, and logistical details, and will aid in organizing and planning for a successful trip.

Maine has 65 historical lighthouses and 230 miles of coastline (3,500 miles of tidal coastline), so scenic opportunities are abundant. February's presentation will feature images of four well known lighthouses and will also include local and shoreline photos from the Mount Desert Island and Schoodic Point areas.

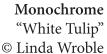

GETTING STARTED AS A PROFESSIONAL PHOTOGRAPHER ~ February 4th ~



About our Presenters: Upstate Photographers was formed in 2006 when Paul Grupp, working as a staff photographer for the NY State Senate, asked Brenda Rose if she was interested in joining him in opening a full-time professional studio. Now located in Troy NY, their well-equipped 2000 sq ft loft-style Upstate Photographers studio does about 50% of their business in weddings, and the rest in a diverse portfolio ranging from headshots for entertainers and professionals, boudoir/bpix for brides to be, and fashion photography for small boutiques, concert photography and promo pix

for working musicians, and commercial photography for restaurants, bars, the medical industry and real estate. Paul explains, "In our area, we opened our studio space just as many other professionals were closing theirs. We feel that having our own shooting space, located in a city rich with possibilities for location work gives us a real edge over our competitors. Because we're always set up, ready to go, we can profitably do small jobs like headshots that would be more difficult if you don't have a studio. And I think in general, but especially for wedding meetings, having our own dedicated space is vital."

Why Photography? Paul says, "All my life I dreamed of becoming a professional photographer some day. In high school, while the other kids were playing football, I was in the library studying the work of some of my favorites: Yousef Karsh, Edward Steichen, Irving Penn, Richard Avedon, and a young lady named Annie Leibovitz. In my mid-40s, I got a chance to leave my marketing job in the corporate world and open a studio, and I jumped on it. I never thought I'd shoot weddings, but while I was working as staff photographer for the NY State Senate, somebody talking me into attending a Joe Buissink wedding photography seminar. His work was so powerful, so honest -- I literally sat there in the auditorium and cried. He taught me that you can approach weddings with artistic integrity - do what you do, and do it well, and people will come. I tried it, and fell in love with the wedding business. Then when I met Brenda eight years ago, there was never any question -- she came into the business and the rest is history!" We are fiercely competitive with each other, always encouraging each other to do our very best.

What's Our Secret to Success? We think a key element to our success over the years has been

our diversity. We know that if we had JUST shot weddings, we'd be struggling with burnout. But because we do so many different types of work, it's always fresh and interesting. It also greatly extends our marketing reach -- shoot a concert with thousands of attendees who come to your website or Facebook page to see the pix, and a small but significant percentage of those people will end up calling you when it's time for wedding photography, a headshot, or some bpix.

How to Become a Professional Photographer and Survive the Experience!

Paul Grupp has had the opportunity to start out or start over as a professional photographer several times - 1st in San Diego, then working for the NY State Senate, then starting a home studio in Voorheesville with partner Brenda Rose, and finally opening a full-time dedicated studio in Troy NY. Along the way, Paul

and Brenda have had the opportunity to make a fair number of mistakes, accumulate a bumper crop of life lessons, and ultimately, enjoy modest success. Through their experiences, you will learn how to realistically assess your own strengths and weaknesses as a potential "pro-to-be," learn what it takes to differentiate yourself from the pack, and hopefully, decide that being "just" an amateur photographer isn't such a bad

thing! Brenda swears she's joking when she says that, but she will also give you a unique perspective on exactly how difficult this profession is to break into, and what it takes to keep it fresh, exciting, and profitable every day.

Travel: A Photo Travel image must "express the feeling of a time and place, portray a land, its people, or a culture in its natural state, and has no geographical limitations." Ultra close-ups which lose their identity, studio-type model shots, or photographic manipulations that misrepresent the true situation or alter the content of the image are unacceptable in Photo Travel competition. No pictorial elements may be moved, cloned, added, deleted, rearranged or combined. No manipulation or modification is permitted except resizing, cropping, selective lightening or darkening, sharpening, and restoration of original color to the scene. Any adjustments must appear natural.

PID (*Projected Image Division*): Here is an opportunity to enter your favorite images - no restrictions! The prints may be in color or monochrome. Our club may enter up to six (6) images from six different makers. Sizing, as with all entries, is the same as the SPS digital projection: 1024 x 768 pixels.

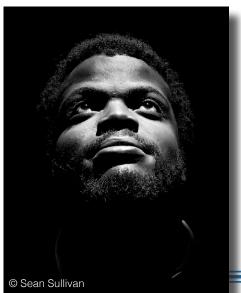
MANAGING YOUR LIGHTROOM CATALOG ON YOUR IPAD -

Sean Sullivan ~ February 11th ~

While Sean's interest in photography dates back to his youth (early 70's), he regained his passion for photography about 10 years ago when he purchased his first DSLR, a Nikon D70. Since then he has grown and learned (and continues to learn) about all aspects of the art. He loves to try new techniques and tools and enjoys being a member of SPS. Sean loves portrait and event photography, as well as artistic fine art imagery.



Here's a Synopsis of Sean's Presentation: In today's busy world it's not always easy to keep up with managing your Lightroom catalog. Digital photography tends to make some of us photographers shutter click crazy producing sometimes several hundred images in a short time. How does one keep up with managing, prun-



ing, rating and sharing all those photos without spending hours in front of your PC? Wouldn't it be nice if you could manage them while on the go? Waiting at the doctors office? During lunch at work? At the beach? Waiting at the shoe store while your significant other tries on those 15 pairs of shoes? Well, I'm going to demonstrate some iPad/iPhone apps that will allow you to do just that. There are several free applications that directly interface with Lightroom and Photoshop that allow you to manage your catalog and do minor editing (or even not so minor) of your images without the need to be at your desk for hours.

"Finally to my lovely wife for putting up with and allowing me to indulge."

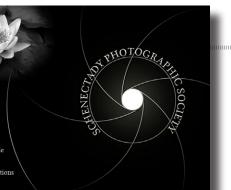
