Which brings me to another thought, although we discontinued the smartphone competition, smartphone images can be entered into both print and projected image competitions. So, keep them coming!

I am a voracious reader, put a cereal box in front of me at breakfast and I can amuse myself for a long time! As you can guess, photography is one of my favorite topics. I'd like to share some of my recent eclectic readings over the past few weeks:

- The December issue of Shutterbug Magazine reports that analog photography is making a comeback. Kodak reports that sales of their professional film grew more than 5% in the last few years. Maybe I traded in my film cameras too soon....

To get additional "bells and whistles," you have to purchase the Pro Adjustments. But the free download is a good place to start.) I downloaded and installed it last week. Haven't played with it much yet, more to follow.

PHOTOGRAPHING WATERFALLS by Jeff Perkins

Who doesn't love waterfalls? Particularly as photographers, this type of landscape imagery can give great results and is most pleasurable as well.

There is nothing that hits the senses as much as moving water, the smell of the moist earth, the potential colors depending on the season of the year.

For me, water for photography is better than Xanax!

First of all you need to have an idea of where the waterfall is located. Not just on a map for directions but is it located deep in the valley; is it out in the open where it might receive a great deal of light; what time of the day, if the waterfall face is oriented east or west will the sunshine on the waterfalls and make a lot of hotspots in the flowing water? You have to answer these questions or you may be disappointed in your images.

After you have safely arrived at your waterfall destination you have to figure what type of photograph you want. If you want to stop the action of the waterfall, then you need a fast shutter speed. For me, almost all the time I love the soft flowing, silky effect of water rolling over the rocks and into the crevices..

My set up is with tripod, digital camera, medium wide angle zoom lens, polarizing filter is a must, shutter release of some kind or use the timer button to avoid camera shake. If you want the slow moving silky effect, a tripod is pretty much a must.

Camera settings that have worked best for me and my experience is to set the aperture at F-16, the shutter speed will generally be about one second with the polarizer, and always set the ISO to its lowest possible setting for your camera. In my case that would be 100. With this set up, I have never needed neutral density filters to slow the water further. On my Fuji systems, I generally find automatic white balance does a great job. With your individual camera you will have to determine if that works fine or you need to make adjustments for the light in which you are shooting.



As you make your composition, make sure there are no extraneous elements in the frame; look carefully at your histogram–your Light Meter in essence. For waterfall photography you want the histogram to be slightly off to the left. With today's modern digital cameras you can recover detail from the shadows, but you cannot recover details from the highlights (the really bright areas of the waterfall).

I always snap a few images with slight variations in shutter speed, check the images afterwards and make appropriate adjustments for the next exposures..

Editing is within the program that you are most comfortable. If you shoot raw, you need an appropriate Raw editor, if you shoot JPEG's which I do in my Fuji X pro system, I can use some simpler photo editing apps.. Lately my favorite has been google's Snapseed. I like to bring out the dynamic range a little bit and detail in the shadows.



This App does a great job as well as boosting tonal contrast and creating shortness in detail.

Lastly, some of the later generation iPhones are able to create this silky flowing affect. If that is your preference, certainly go for it.

Nevertheless, get out there and have fun with your camera gear!









LETTER TO THE EDITOR



Former member, Claudia Jokubowski (who relocated to Maine) sent me and Phil an e-mail recently. I thought it was interesting, and perhaps our members would appreciate her insights about her "new club," and my reply.

CLAUDIA...

Hi. How are you both? I hope the Club is off to a good season. I may get there in November when I'm home from Maine.

I just wanted to let the both of you know that I went to the Portland Camera Club last night for their projected night competition. I haven't joined the club yet but I thought I would check it out. There are a lot of members but the same demographic as our club. I guess there isn't another club except in Bangor which is pretty far away. Their competition is vastly different than ours so I'm so happy that I went because I learned how other clubs may judge. They use three in-house judges. Each judge has some type of electronic scorer with which they assign a point value. If the point value has a spread of greater than 10 points, they have to give reasons why, otherwise, an image appears and a score is given; no critigue. At first, it took me a while to figure it out. I thought I was at the races.

This club seems to focus heavily on the technical. My goodness, I would be afraid to enter because they seem to notice everything that was wrong in an image. Artsy, fartsy did not seem like it would do well. No street photography and lots of landscapes and birds.

I have to say that I missed Schenectady because I learned so much from hearing all the different judges' perspectives and takes on a photograph. I also learned that a photograph can be technically "perfect" and not move me, whereas something less competent can speak volumes.

On the plus side, the club does seem to have workshop-type lectures when there isn't a competition. I went to one last week on "Light Painting" and a the speaker had a whole vignette set up and then walked us through the whole process including post production.

I hope all is well with you both and maybe I will see you in November. This two-state living is a bit challenging sometime but overall it is good.

LINDA...

Hi, Claudia. It's great to hear from you. Any snow in Maine yet? (If not...I think there will be soon.)

I appreciate the feedback regarding the Portland Club's competition. I was also in other clubs, and really think SPS has the best competition method. My Bronx club used the 3-judge scorers at endof-year. It was interesting to see how differently the judges felt about one image - i.e. scores of 9, 9, 7 or 9, 8, 7 or even 9, 9, 6! For end-of-year, we did an in-and-out first. The judges scored 1 for in and 0 for out. An image needed at least two 1's to be in. Then they scored the "ins" from 6 to 9. The total of the three scores determined the winning image. If there was a tie, the judges decided amongst themselves to choose a winner and a runner up.

I like the SPS method of judging because the judges really compare the images and choose the ones they believe excel. In my other clubs, the image (either print or projected) just came up once and got scored (one judge). Also I think it's important to critique every image...the winners because it's nice to know what the judge saw to deem it a winner...the losers because the photographer wants to learn and know why their image wasn't chosen. Of course, there are many occasions when the judge has only positive comments on ALL the images (which I personally find a bit frustrating).

It's too bad the Portland club is really stuck on the technical aspects of photography - there's so much more. Our judges do, in fact, judge that way as well sometimes. It's frustrating if you want to enter, say, a selective-focus macro or even a manipulated image. But I still enter what I like and leave it up to the gods to decide whether or not my image is "worthy." And I have learned that regional clubs do seem to have their biases and preferences. Street photography always seems to do well at SPS (although it's not my strength.) The motto I live by is, "Your image should not just be what you see...it should be what you feel." Sometimes that calls for a bit of manipulation or interpretation. Of course, some of the "technical aspects" will always apply-but I don't believe they should be the be-all-and-end-all. In fact, when a "rule" is broken successfully, it is usually a great image. In any event, I like to compete with images that I enjoy and wish to share with my peers.

This season we started our "competition nights" with critiques. The audience got a chance to comment on the prints & digital projected images. No scores...no winners...no losers. I think it was a productive way to begin the season. This month we had our regular print & projected competitions. The season is off to a good start.

I think even if you aren't comfortable with competing in Portland just yet, you will surely learn from attending the competitions. And you will learn what they are generally looking for in a winning image...although you may just disagree and put in what speaks to you. I know it will "speak" to some of the other members as well...win or lose.

I do hope to see you in Schenectady one of these days. Check the website. We have reduced the number of meetings this season - and we start at 7 pm. In the interim, have a Happy Thanksgiving.

F©CUS ON RICH SCHREIBSTEIN



My first camera was a Kodak Brownie, I got it when I was six and living in Japan when my father was stationed in Yokohama after the Korean War. I took my first photo of Mount Fuji and I was hooked. In high school, I was the photographer for our school newspaper and yearbook and learned my way around a darkroom. I still have Dektol flashbacks. I majored in journalism at the University of Texas at El Paso and primarily used a Rolleiflex for my photography courses. I had visions of becoming a photojournalist, however, in 1969 the government had other plans.

Rather than wait to be drafted, I enlisted in the Army after graduation and subsequently received my commission through Infantry OCS. I spent eight years on active duty as a platoon leader and company commander. While stationed in Germany, my wife bought me a Canon FTb which resulted in a few thousand slides boxed up in our Altamont basement awaiting an emergency call from Phil when a guest speaker cancels on short notice.

When I left the service, I had a wife and daughter and my dream of wandering the world taking photographs and writing were abandoned. I joined the corporate world. Other than being the designated family photographer, I did no other photography until I retired in 2010 and got my first digital, a Canon EOS 1D. I switched to a Canon EOS 40D in 2012 and went mirrorless with a Sony a6000 in 2015. I primarily shoot with a Sony Zeiss 35mm, f/1.8, and a Sony 18-105mm, f/4 zoom.

I have two photography mentors: my brother, who lives in Virginia, told me that after I take a shot to turn around; and an old Army buddy in California, with a *National Geographic* cover to his credit, told me to just get out and shoot what pleases me. I get out at least once a week where I concentrate on black and white street shooting using Lightroom, Photoshop, SilverEfex Pro2, and Topaz Studio for post-production.

I joined last season and attended a few meetings. This year I realized the key was the competition; viewing other members' photographs, listening to the judge's comments, and understanding how to critique my work.



PRINT JUDGE: Photographer Chris DeMarco received her BFA from Rochester Institute of Technology and her MFA from Pratt Institute. She has served as an adjunct professor for the College of Saint Rose, Saint Anne Institute, and Russell Sage College. DeMarco's imagery usually consists of landscapes and architecture, as she aims to show how both evolve over time, disintegrating and morphing due to both man made and natural factors. She will often return to the same locations year by year to document the decay of abandoned locations, such as motels, restaurants, or military sites. The unique forms and colors in these crumbling areas cause them to serve as found sculptures or

earthworks.

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
