### PHOTOGRAPHING THE BALD EAGLE, OUR NATIONAL BIRD **Howard Arndt - January 17**

Howard Arndt is a wildlife and landscape photographer who resides in Amherst, NH, with his wife Marcia. They were residents of Central New York for many years and they still have a family cabin in the Adirondacks. Howard is retired from a career in aerospace where he worked for General Electric and Lockheed Martin. He has electrical engineering degrees from the University of Kansas and an MBA from Syracuse University.

For the past ten years he has focused on his lifelong passion for photography. He has taken numerous photography courses and has traveled widely to explore the world through photography. In addition to the United States, he has traveled to Africa and the Galapagos to photograph exotic wildlife. His passion is the bald eagle, which was the stimulus for his interest in wildlife photography. He recently presented his program "Photographing the Bald Eagle, Our National Bird" at the National Museum of Wildlife Art in Jackson, Wyoming. He has been published in Adirondack Life and Outdoor Photographer magazines and has had winning images in several photo contests including Adirondack Life, Central New York Art Competitions and Audubon Photography.



He has his work for sale in three galleries including Dartbrook Rustic Goods in Keene, NY.

#### **Mentorship and Growth**

I have two major art interests; photography and Jazz. Reading some recent articles on both of

these interests got me thinking about mentorship and how other photographers, especially fellow SPS members, have made very positive impacts on my growth as a photographer.

Clark Terry, a jazz trumpet legend and educator who performed with Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Quincy Jones, and other accomplished jazz musicians, shared his thoughts on mentorship. Terry suggested that growth through mentorship required three stages. Once we have found a mentor, growth requires that we must *Imitate, assimilate and innovate* our mentor's work.

One item on my photography bucket list is to become a better nature and landscape photographer, a genre of photography that I'm not good at and have a lot to learn. Lately I've been following Carl Heilman's photography and have adopted him as a mentor. Applying Clark Terry's philosophy to my growth in nature photography, I've started the *imitate* process by studying his work and reading

his books. 2018 will find me taking at least one workshop with him and *assimilating* his approach to exposure, location and composition. Finally, I'll *innovate* by taking my learnings and develop my personal approach to nature photography.

No discussion about mentorship would be complete without recognizing those photographers who have been instrumental in my personal growth. My thanks to Jim Craner whose workshops have taught me the finer points of printing and print presentation; Bob Coppola's advice to "make it monochrome and resubmit it" gave me the direction to always take a second look at an image and consider what that image could be; Doug Mitchell who introduced me to the finer points of studio lighting; Linda Tommasulo's sage advice to "do one for myself" opened a door into photo essays; and Lawrence White who taught me how to tease those details out of the image's midtones. Mentors are all around us, especially at our meetings, have you reached out lately?

### MASTERING THE MIDTONES Lawrence White - January 3

Most of us are familiar with *Saratoga Living* photographer, Lawrence White, who has graced our club with his presentations and excellent judging. We are pleased he will be returning in the New Year to teach us how to "master the midtones."

Lawrence White's professional photography career spans over four decades. In that period of time his photographic work has been seen world wide in publications such as the *NY Times, Boston Globe, Rolling Stone, Vogue, People, Time, Forbes, Der Spiegel* and *Le Monde*.

In addition to numerous exhibitions and awards, Lawrence won the NY Press Association award for his striking images of the terrorist attacks on NYC, 9-11-01.


His film work has been collected by the Smithsonian Museum Archives of American Art. Lawrence also received a short film award from the American Film Institute in 1994.

For the past three years Lawrence taught a series of highly successful photo workshops in conjunction with Saratoga Arts, the National Museum of Dance and the Saratoga Performing Arts Center.

Lawrence is currently Chief Photographer for Saratoga Living Magazine where he also writes a column. He is also proud to be capturing images for the Agricultural Stewardship Association who has saved numerous family farms in upstate NY. In addition he continues to photograph a series of images focusing on the Soho neighborhood in Lower Manhattan.

On January 3rd, Lawrence will demonstrate how to "Master the Midtones." Per Lawrence:

"Black and white and color." OK, those are facets of photography - but what happens in the middle? Lets dive into the rich sea of unending tones that define an image and present our ideas to the viewer's eye.



Please bring two (2) jpegs on a thumb drive. One jpeg that you have processed in the digital darkroom as well as the unprocessed jpeg file of the same image. I will select a few to download as examples for processing in Photoshop during the presentation.

At the same time we will also discuss some of the work by Irving Penn, and Annie Liebovitz who typify use of full tone image preparation in "black and white and color."

#### **BEGINNER WINTER PHOTOGRAPHY TIPS & TECHNIQUES**

Winter brings its own set of issues for photographers by Kyle Schurman - Updated September 25, 2017

Shooting photographs in the winter can be a challenging prospect. Shooting in cold weather can cause foggy lenses and batteries that drain more quickly than usual, for example. Then there are exposure problems caused by sun and reflective snow.

Each of these challenges can be difficult to deal with on its own, but it can be a significant hindrance to your photographic results if you have to try to combat more than one of these issues.

Try these tips to improve your winter photography results and overcome any problems that the weather conditions may give you:

- White balance is the biggest problem with shooting photographs in environments with a combination of white snow and bright sunlight. When automatic cameras have problems properly judging white balance, white objects in the photos tend to have a bluish look. If possible, manually adjust the white balance setting on the camera to a cloudy day setting, which should remove the blue tint from the snow.
- If you'd rather not rely on the white balance to create the proper settings in a scene of bright, white snow, you have a few other options. Using a "snow" or "winter" scene mode sometimes can help with this problem.
- Exposure can be tricky to set properly for winter photography. If you have an object that you want to be properly exposed in the image, place it in the center of the frame. Hold the shutter button halfway. Then recompose the photo so the object is where you want it to appear, while continuing to hold the shutter button halfway, which holds the exposure in place. Then press the shutter fully to record the image.



Snowflakes falling in your winter photo may appear blurred, which can provide an interesting look.

- As another option, especially if there are a lot of harsh shadows in the image from bright sunlight on white snow, try forcing the flash to fire. With bright external light, the flash can act as a fill flash, removing harsh shadows on the subjects and improving exposure.
- Look for some interesting nature photos, as winter and snow provide plenty of opportunities. For example, look for evergreen branches covered in snow, brightly colored berries peeking out from snow, an animal standing in a field of snow, or icicles hanging from trees. Basically, any contrasting color can stand out from the white snow, creating an interesting nature photo.
- One benefit of shooting in the bright conditions of snow and sun is your camera can use a fast shutter speed, allowing you to easily shoot action photos of a skier moving down the mountain or a snowball fight. Take advantage of the fact that there's plenty of light available and shoot all of the action photos that you want.

- If it's snowing while you're shooting the photos, you may have some snowflakes that appear blurred across the frame of the image, as shown in the photo on page 6. As long as this blur doesn't detract from the subject quality in the photo, the blurred snow look can provide a nice look in your image.
- If you're shooting on a cloudy day with snow cover, your photos can have a flat, dull look. Depending on the thickness of the clouds, you may want to use a fill flash for all photos. With thin clouds, though, the snow will still reflect plenty of diffused sunlight, making good exposures easier. Different types of clouds can lead to different requirements for exposure, so be sure to try a few different techniques, perhaps even using exposure bracketing.
- If you had planned to shoot photos on a particular day, but you wake up to snow falling outdoors, don't automatically give up on the day. The ability to shoot images with snow falling around the subjects can create some great photographs. With the snow falling in the foreground, you can focus on a subject in the background, and the falling snow will have a blurred effect around the subject, for example. Just be sure to keep the camera in a waterproof camera bag or a zipped plastic bag when it isn't in use, protecting it from wet snow.
- Finally, be sure to take special care of your equipment in winter conditions. Obviously, avoid extremely cold conditions for long periods of time, which can drain your battery or cause the LCD to malfunction. Quickly moving the camera from warm to cold conditions can fog the lens or cause condensation inside the camera, which could cause damage. In fact, such condensation eventually could lead to mold growing inside the camera. Or you could end up with a lens that's constantly foggy, leaving you unable to shoot clear images in the future. So move the camera slowly from outdoors to indoors, allowing the camera's temperature to rise steadily, rather than suddenly. Place the camera in an unheated garage or car first, then move it to a pocket near your body while you're still outdoors, where your body temperature will help to warm up the camera slowly, before moving indoors.

# F@CUS ON



Around 1993, I asked my mom for an electric skillet for Christmas. Knowing my dislike of cooking, she internally questioned my request but, feeling encouraged that I was actually going to try my hand at it, she bought it for me anyway. On Christmas morning when I opened my electric skillet, I jumped for joy. My mother, completely baffled, said, "I am just so surprised at your new and sudden interest in cooking food in a skillet!" I replied, "You thought I wanted it to cook food in?! It's for cooking Polaroid photographs Mom!"

Those were the days—the really creative photography days. When I would shut myself in a pitch black closet or sit down on a street corner with a black bag, carefully (and blindly) changing my extremely light sensitive roll of infrared film; when I cooked Polaroids in an electric skillet, lifted them out with a spatula and arranged them onto wet watercolor paper. The hours spent using a Polaroid camera and a crochet hook to move and manipulate the exposing Polaroid's wet emulsion. I fondly remember using a brayer and rolling my fresh Polaroids onto wet watercolor paper after carefully counting the seconds; or when I painted my black and white print with rubber cement to

cover certain areas, then submerged the print into a sepia toner for a selectively-toned image. My all-time favorite process was using Marshall's oils, cotton balls and toothpicks to hand color my black and white infrared prints. There was a real creative process, a hands on experience, with time, effort and money, invested into this final image. If it worked, it was spectacular. If it didn't, it usually went into the garbage with some blood, sweat, tears...and a little piece of my heart.

Flash forward to 2017–I haven't done hands-on artistic photography in probably 10 years. The items slowly became unavailable and thus, very costly. That "look" went out of style, and because photography has been my livelihood for 25 years now, it just became "old," like me!

Then I got my hands on an iPhone 7 Plus, and all that joy of photography I had experienced all those years ago came flooding back. With a few clicks here and a few taps there, I am creating images in less than a minute that would have taken hours in the days of my electric skillet. The image quality is decent, the photo editing apps are endless, and the opportunities to create are immeasurable!

My favorite app is *Snapseed* for all my image editing, and I also use *Distressed FX*, which allows you to add really cool textures and also gives you the ability to add flying birds to your image, which I love as a unique option.

While a part of me will always pine for the smell of the darkroom, and I will always fondly remember the hands-on, artistic process, it is wonderful to have my creativity flowing again and to experience that feeling of such excitement when you click (well, in this case, tap), adjust, and end up with an image that you sure hope will be a top-scoring winner at SPS!

David was trained and worked as a professional photographer in the 1970's, left that career a few years later and returned to photography as a creative outlet in 2003.










