- Entries must bear the original entry card on the back of the mount.
- Entries must be the exact same image as entered previously. No retouched, reprinted, or reproduced image will be entered.
- All other presentation and entry rules are the same as for the monthly competitions.

 Each maker may submit ONE (1) entry in General (Color) and ONE (1) in Monochrome.

#### USING TEXTURE ART IN POST PROCESSING Linda E. Eastman - May 2

The digital age of photography has brought many changes to the processing and manipulation of photos. The dark room has been replaced by a computer and digital imagery has become a new art form. Texture Art combines standard photography with one or more overlays to create unique works of art. Linda E. Eastman will show before and after pictures of her work and describe the effect she was looking for in each. #### HAVE COME FULL CIRCLE, BUT STILL THINK B&W IS TRUE PHOTOGRAPHY Rob Near - May 9

During the seventies I started my photography love affair shooting Tri-X and Plus-X film with the Olympus OM-1 35mm camera system vanishing into the darkroom to process and print images. From the seventies I kept the Olympus system but added to it with medium and 4x5 format cameras and continued to be dedicated to B&W film.

As the digital revolution began I was looking to jump into the new format and was looking to Olympus to have the system to jump to, but this was not the case and I was not impressed with the Olympus digital system. So, this loyal Olympus shooter made the jump over to the Nikon with the Nikon D200 and this continued up to the D700 after a few years. The D700 was getting old and I was looking at making the move to the next generation Nikon body, but now the micro four third systems were starting to develop. My original thought was there is no way that tiny micro four third sensors could give the results I was getting from the D700 full frame system. It was about this time I ran into Dan Burkholder and he told me he had sold his Canon full frame system and made the move to Olympus micro four thirds and felt mirrorless was the future.

It was this point that my memories of that little rugged OM-1 and how much I missed it started me thinking. So I figured I would give the micro four thirds system a try. I purchased a used E-M5 and a couple of Olympus lenses, figuring it was not that much of investment since the used price was very reasonable. For the next year I continued to shoot with both the EM-5 and D700 and I will admit during this time the D700 was the king with low light and dynamic range, but I was falling in love again with Olympus and the in-body stabilization. I was always the photographer that would tell everyone you needed to shoot with a tripod but I was finding I was getting great results by hand holding the E-M5 with in-body stabilization.

Within the second year of owning the E-M5 I made the decision to go fully with micro four thirds and



I sold off my Nikon gear. From this point to today I have gone from the E-M5 to the E-M1 mark II along with many of the Olympus Pro lenses so I have come back home to the system that started it all for me.

OK I know what you are saying...what happened to the B&W? Once I started doing digital work I did and continue to shoot color, but B&W is still my love and is what I feel I do best. Maybe it is the fact that I am color blind in red/green so I am always worried about the colorcast I am not seeing in my color images. I feel we have even more power to produce B&W images today that outshine B&W from the film days.

During the May 9th SPS meeting I will give some additional thoughts about the digital systems we have today and go through my typical B&W imaging processing from capture to all the software I run the image through.

## F@CUS ON LANCE MONOTONE

I've thought of myself as a musician and songwriter since I was very young, but my love for photography didn't come until the advent of cellphones. I have always been drawn to color, patterns and fleeting moments, and being able to capture the world around me sparked my creativity in an unexpectedly rewarding way. My first interchangeable-lens camera, a Panasonic G5 MFT, has since given way to a Nikon D800, and I primarily shoot with a Sigma 24-70mm f/2.8 lens. Although I tend to shoot landscapes because they're so easy to find here, I am always experimenting with new camera techniques, Photoshop skills and subject matter. My greatest enjoyment comes from seeing my progress grow with each new technique I try.


