
DREAM - BELIEVE - CREATE by John Barclay November 17, 2021

John's Bio

I always created images, but I was never "a photographer." I told myself I wasn't creative. I wasn't artistic. My stick figures were failures. But I had this new camera and I wanted to learn how to use it. On the first night of my first photo workshop, I stared in awe at the images shared by the group. The dream of being a "good" photographer was born. I sought out great photographers like Dan Sniffin, Tony Sweet and Nancy Rotenberg and I emulated them, listened to them, and learned from them. But I became a photographer in my own right when Nancy forbade me to look through anyone else's viewfinder for the entire duration of an epic trip to Africa. "Follow YOUR vision," she said, "and make the pictures that only you can see."

Doubtful, but willing, I began looking for the images that spoke directly to me, that pulled my eye or aroused my imagination. I looked for connection, and found my photographer self.

I created my program "Dream • Believe • Create" to reflect my artistic journey. I began my journey with few skills, but aspired to be better. I watched and learned, gained a bit of confidence, and then began to see photography not only as a reflection of the world around me, but also as the representation of the reality inside me. My photographic journey freed me to create what was uniquely mine. Being genuinely aware of the beauty around me as I look through my lens feeds my soul and brings me great joy. I encourage the participants in my workshops to share that journey and discover the artist residing inside each of them.



Following that inner eye, I photograph whatever makes my

heart sing. I have explored diverse subjects and continue to learn processing techniques that bring my vision to life. I am eager to share my journey with my tour members, to help them pay attention to what turns their heads, to help them feel more connected to the experience of making unique images that make their hearts, too, sing.

START THINKING ABOUT YOUR PHOTO ESSAY

Competition: March 16, 2022

Yes, the Photo Essay competition is a long way off, but it takes time to plan and put together. Start now!

I cannot encourage members enough to try their hand at a photo essay. It's creative, challenging and fun to put together, but it does take a little more time than shooting a few images and submitting them for competition.

So, what is a photo essay? Finding a subject is all about finding your photo passion. What do you love taking photos of? Do you love a subject like flowers, dogs or horses? Perhaps it's a special place or event...photos from a trip to Yellowstone Park, Argentina or Nantucket? Pull together your best shots around a topic and then create a slide show, video, time lapse, or all of the above.

Building a slide show isn't difficult. There are a number of programs you can use. It doesn't matter if you are on a Mac- or Windows-based computer. Lightroom Classic includes a module for editing photos into a slide show complete with music and video. The most popular program for creating slide shows on a PC has been ProShow Gold. Unfortunately, this software is no longer supported, but you can find it or alternatives on the web.

If you are a Mac user, then FotoMagico (by Boinx) is a popular slideshow builder and relatively easy to use.

Look for software that allows you to control the

pace of the slideshow and match the transitions to the music. It may also allow for movement, called the Ken Burns effect, zooming in on your images to add impact. Select music that fits the mood of your photos and set the pace of your images to also fit that mood. Remember to use non-copyrighted or "rights free" music since we will be broadcasting on Zoom and including the winners on YouTube. Just Google search for "rights-free music." Some websites offer free music if you annotate the copyright holder.


Our rules allow for photo essays up to 8 minutes, however, this is generally too long. Optimum time would be 3-5 minutes. For good flow, every image needs to earn its place in your slideshow. Sadly, sometimes you have to remove an image you love.

Once you're happy with your photo essay, save the file as either a .mov file (Mac QuickTime file) or the standard PC based .mp4 file. Most of the programs offer a variety of file formats for saving your essay. When it's properly saved, send it to Dow Smith, chair of the Photo Essay Competition at dowsmith323@gmail.com using "dropbox," "WeTransfer" or any of the cloud-based services that handle large files.


When my son headed off to college, I needed a diversion and moved to Park City, Utah. On the trip west I once again picked up a camera, at this time it was



10 QUICK TIPS FOR CLOSE-UP PHOTOGRAPHY OM Digital Solutions Field Guide

Although some of these tips are specific to the Olympus Micro 4/3 system, there's some good advice for anyone who wants to get better close-ups.

1

Know Your Minimum Distance



The closest working distance of a macro lens describes the minimum distance between the front of your lens and the subject.

While a close working distance may be fine for flowers and other stationary objects, it can disturb insects and other small creatures. Try using a telephoto lens – it's longer working distance will allow you to give your subjects more space to be themselves!

Try A New Focal Length



Prime, telephoto zoom, and even wide-angle lenses can help to create some great images!

Use a wide-angle lens to capture close up subjects and the world around them or try a long zoom to isolate your subject from the background and create a soft bokeh.

Go Outside



Small subjects can be found all around, even your own backyard. Look for flowers, insects, colors, patterns - and then get up close. See the world in a new way!

4

Work the Light



An overcast and cloudy day can make for some of the best lighting conditions for close up photography.

When shooting in harsh sunlight conditions try casting shade with your body to diffuse the light or find subjects in a shaded area.

5

Find Your Focus



When photographing subjects close up, your depth of field will be very shallow, causing parts of your subject to fade into soft blur. Use single point focus to focus on the most important part of your subject. To get more of your subject in sharp focus you may need to stop down your aperture.

6

Stack It Up



Sometimes you're looking for a little more focusing power. Select OM-D cameras and TG cameras have built- in-in Focus Stacking. This feature allows you to automatically take several shots at multiple focus points, and merges them together in camera for one sharp image!

7

Add More Light



Sometimes lighting conditions are not ideal for very close photography. Don't be afraid to add in extra lighting. Using the Olympus STF-8 Macro Flash Set you can illuminate your macro subjects with precision. Or try the FL-700WR Flash to add some fill light on a sunny day. Don't forget a diffuser to soften the light!

Don't Be Afraid Of The Rain



Flowers, mushrooms, bugs and outdoor textures all change when the rain arrives. Use a weathersealed lens like the M.Zuiko 60mm F2.8 or 12-45mm F4.0 PRO lens paired with a weathersealed camera, and don't let the elements hold you back from that amazing shot!

9

Wake Up Early



In the early, colder hours of the morning you will usually find that insects are slower moving and easier to photograph. You will have more opportunities to take photos when they are more still and calm.

10

Be A Pro with Pro Capture



For fast moving subjects try using Olympus' Pro Capture Mode. This is a great way to capture images that would normally not be possible! Pro Capture Mode allows you to take split second shots before your shutter was pressed.

A WORD ON COMPETING IN THE ASSIGNED TOPICS

Participating in competitions can be many things... exhilarating, exciting, disappointing, rewarding, fun...and challenging. Even more so with the Assigned Topics. But that is what they are designed to do: challenge you and get you out of your comfort zone shooting something different.

Just as we trust that images submitted are taken within the prescribed timeline (this season, on or after May 1, 2021), we also rely on members to submit images that "fit the topic." Granted, some assignments leave a wide parameter of interpretation, while others are more specific. It is imperative, however, that participants review the full description of the topic, and not just the quick notation in the calendar. You can find this season's Assigned Topics here.

Oftentimes in the Assigned Topic competition you will see a judge critique an image and sing it's praises, only to dismiss it because, in the judge's estimation, it does not fit the assignment. To the

contrary, sometimes an entry slips by that does not specifically fit the Assigned Topic. And, even more disconcerting, although rarely, the entry is deemed a winner.

Rest assured that the judges are always given the full Assigned Topic description; even so, errors can be made. Judges are not perfect, and the position of the SPS Board is that the Judges' decisions are final. The best way to avoid situations like this in the future is for members to be cognizant of the Assigned Topic and be sure their image truly "fits the bill." Of course, it also increases your chances of winning! Be sure to read the full descriptions before submitting. Any questions or requests for clarification can be directed to:
