In celebration of the majesty of trees and woodlands, this project examines in-depth the fine art of seeing and photographing these magnificent life forms. It is commonly thought that to photograph forests well, one has to make order out of the chaos. That's true, but there's so much more to artfully portraying trees. Mark will delve deep into seeing creative possibilities, composing for visual separation and to accentuate lines, forms, patterns and textures. He'll offer strategies for photographing deep inside forests, along their edges and from on high, and illustrate the artistic opportunities presented by different weather and lighting conditions, most notably, fog.



Good tree and forest imagery is also elevated through artistic processing. Mark will cover effective contrast and color adjustments, image softening techniques, abstract expressionism and amazing black and white conversion—all with the goal of creating moody, atmospheric woodland images that convey the beauty, grace and the power of trees.

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

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

Ken Sklute Photographic Explorer

Ken Sklute has enjoyed a varied and successful photographic career. He began his photographic journey as a young teenager photographing 200 mph dragsters at his local track. Although his photographic knowledge was limited, his images displayed an innate understanding of composition and clearly showed his ability to capture images that people wanted...and were willing to pay for... and so started his career.

Ken soon took a job as apprentice to an established wedding photographer, but he quickly graduated to photographing weddings on his own. He developed a style that was recognizable, desirable, and bookable and eventually branched out to start his own company. He even started photographic trends with his unique wedding images that competing wedding photographers would mimic in their own work.

Over the years Ken has explored and photographed:

- Tornado Alley – His interest and love of severe weather took Ken on a 5-year journey professionally chasing and photographing storms in tornado alley and throughout America's Midwest.
- Volcanos and Lava – Photographing flowing lava has taken Ken to Iceland and Hawaii.
- Drag racing – Ken revisited his youthful passion of photographing drag racing, this time working nationally to capture images for the Associated Press, NHRA.com and National Dragster and many other auto racing magazines.

- Space – Ken's childhood dreams of becoming an astronaut were not to be realized, however that didn't stop him from photographing things related to space, including working with NASA to capture one of the very last shuttle launches.

- Auroras Borealis Chaser – This combines two of Ken's favorite things, space and weather. Chasing the Northern Lights (Auroras) has taken Ken across the top of the world to Iceland, Norway, Canada's Yukon and Northwest Territories, and finally Alaska where Ken offers Aurora-chasing workshops twice a year.

- Hot Air Balloons - After photographing some beautiful hot air balloons flying near his hometown in the '80s Ken took his first ride in one and within 14 months had acquired his own hot air balloon and achieved his commercial hot air pilot license, allowing him to take passengers aloft and to photograph the world from the unique aerial perspective. To this day he flies in AZ and PA as well as the annual Albuquerque festival and many smaller festivals.

In Ken's 46+ year career, he has been sponsored by Canon USA, Epson, Kodak, FStopGear, Delkin Devices, Datacolor and Really-RightStuff and other industry giants, and has done work for Harley Davidson, *New York Times*, Associated Press, NHRA, *Sports Illustrated*, Toyota, and many more clients.





ASSIGNMENT #1

October

FOCUS ON

RON KLEIN

When I learned I would be the “*Focus*” photographer for November, I thought, “No way out of this one, Ron. Take a deep breath, wipe the sweat from your brow, and just do it.”

First, how I started. I got into photography at about age 14 when my dad brought home a Kodak contact printing system. I was mesmerized by the images appearing in developer bath. Dad, less so. He quickly lost interest, but I never did.

I bought a Pentax Spotmatic, built a darkroom in the basement, and tried to do photography. It was painful, and I have very little to show for those early years. I rolled my own film to cut down costs, only black and white of course, and continued to shoot all throughout college and then medical school. I had my negatives developed in local camera shops, knowing that a time would come when I would have a darkroom again and be able to print them myself.

That time came about 20 years later when I prepped for a family trip to Italy and equipped myself with all the film and gadgets I could possibly need. The result was a complete failure. Underexposed, overdeveloped junk. A disaster. I realized I had to start from scratch and actually learn something about photography.

I decided to go back to basics. I bought a 4x5 large format camera and learned how to develop sheet film and studied the zone system and Phil Davis’s BTZS (Beyond The Zone System) That was a turning point for me. I learned enough about film to be able to concentrate on the image. I’ve come to realize that all those lessons learned in the black and white darkroom are directly applicable to the digital experience. The challenges and questions a photographer faces are the same regardless of technology.

We were fortunate enough to be touring Greece during olive harvest. This is near the town of Nafplion.

So where am I now? As most others, I am a convert to digital for all the well-known reasons. I gave up wet darkroom printing because it is nearly impossible to equal the quality of modern papers and printers with chemistry and classic silver bromide papers. That being said, I continue to shoot some large format film which I develop, scan, and print on an Epson large format printer. You may wonder why. The answer is simply because it’s fun.

I also appreciate that this process slows me down, freeing me to concentrate on the basics of light and composition. The equipment is cool. It always attracts bystanders who want to see the image on the ground glass. Did I mention it’s fun? So much fun, at least when things go well.

Although I obviously enjoy the technology, techniques, processes and equipment involved in photography, it’s all in support of what I am trying to capture in my photographs. My photography is about trying to produce a poignant image. Finding that poignant moment is enormously difficult. I’m not sure I can even define it accurately. However, I do distinguish it from the “storytelling” metaphor often used in photography. My goal is for something in the image to connect in some way with our human experience writ large. It doesn’t nec-

essarily have to be profound, just touching in some more universal way than how a simple snapshot affects the participants.

Frankly, I mostly fail at this. But I learn from my occasional successes. I begin by shooting something that captures my interest. Then, I simply look at it. Sometimes I look at it for a very long time. This enables me to see if there is something that touches me. If so, I study it even more to understand exactly the elements that speak to me.

I try to understand how the elements may interact visually. I search for anything that may distract. I crop, recompose, adjust, all in the effort to bring forward the important elements and mitigate distractions. This is often a long process, full of trials and errors. It is this intensely engaging search for poignancy that gives me the most satisfaction and enjoyment and makes the photos very personal for me.

“AI IS KILLING PHOTOGRAPHY?”

Please Read Before Commenting

I've never really talked about the AI thing and my feelings on it. But this week kind of pushed me to write something about it. Also, I'm happy to have a conversation around this topic. To help keep the comments from becoming yet another string of over-ranted-on "the ethics of editing" and should we use Photoshop or not, or how far is too far, please just answer this question:

*Do you believe AI is helping your photography / photo editing or hurting it. And why?
Or What would you like to see for AI in the future.*

There are Two/Three-ish Sides of AI in Photo Editing

First I think it's good to clarify where AI is used in Photo Editing right now. The way I see it, there are three ways:

#1 – Help with the Grunt Work – most of the AI I see out there is to help take away what I call the "grunt work." AI is being used to sort through photos, and find ones with closed eyes, blurry, etc... so people can quickly weed out the bad shots. It's being used to detect noisy or blurry photos and improve image quality. It's also being used to make selections and masking simpler. There's AI sky selection, subject selections, background selection, and now, with the new version of Lightroom...portrait selection. That's specifically the area I'm going to talk about here.

#2 – AI to actually edit the photos for you – there's also AI that does the editing for you. Luminar is probably leading the pack there. But there are other programs that will do the editing for you based on their AI software. Adobe even released a photo restoration filter (under Neural Filters) that automatically detects and removes creases and cracks from old photos for you.

#3 – Adaptive Presets – There are AI Presets too. But consider this. We've had presets for decades. Before this week we had portrait presets and nobody complained. Now we have portrait presets that actually work better because it can find the

eyes, lips, teeth etc...and now they're bad? All that happened is they work better than they used to. It's not like presets were just invented this week.

AI Has Been in LR and PS For Decades?

Here's something to think about. Have you ever clicked the Auto button in LR. Photoshop has had an Auto button in Curves for decades. When you click Auto, the computer was looking at the histogram and tonal values in the photo and making an adjustment. Nobody claimed that "Auto is ruining Photography and creativity" 20 years ago, right? So now that the "Auto" is just more trained and better, all of the sudden it's killing photography?

What is AI Really Doing in Most Cases?

I think a lot of the sentiment comes from not really knowing what (most) AI is doing. Take sky replacement for example. Everyone says AI Sky replacement is killing photography. But in Photoshop, all the AI is doing for you is making the selection. You're still in charge of clicking on the sky you want and that requires a creative skill, talent and an eye for what looks good. Trust me...90% of the photos people send me are technically done well. But most lack the creative skills both in camera and in post processing—and AI isn't helping with that in most cases. The selection part of sky replacement was just a barrier to get to the good stuff, and all AI is doing is helping us get to the good stuff faster and more accurately.

Take the new Portrait masking features in the latest versions of LR and PS. They still require you to know what a good look is. Just because it makes a selection of the eyes automatically, doesn't mean what you do to them is good. That's where the real skill is at – knowing what looks good – not making a selection.

Let's Bring Back the Stick Shift – Manual Transmission!

So here's what I think it's boiled down to and it's actually an age-old argument in all aspects of our lives. It's come down to people thinking that new technology is making (insert whatever activity or career you want here) too easy. Think about it. That's what all of the arguments are saying – "It's becoming too easy."

Some of your cameras have AI in them, with eye focus, etc. I actually had someone tell me that I was cheating because I was using an AF mode that tracked the subject. By the way...this person had a Sony a1. So you mean to tell me that you bought a \$6500 camera...one that's BIGGEST claim to fame is it's auto focus tracking...and you're just going to turn that off and use one tiny point in the center to manually keep on a fast moving bird across the sky? Crazy right? But there are people that feel this way. It's like saying today's drivers are no good because they never had to learn to drive a stick shift.

What I'm seeing most recently with the introduction of the AI Portrait features in Lightroom and Photoshop is that it's taking the creativity out of photography. But I wonder if people realize that these AI features they're talking about are simply making selections for you. That's it! It's grunt work. There is no fun and creativity in making complex selections. As some one who's taught this for 20 years, It's the most hated part of photo editing.

From there, the argument goes to "Well I learned how to make complex selections 10 years ago, and I feel everyone should know how." So now people are saying that you should have to learn the hard way?

I almost feel bad for the amount of pessimism it requires to look at the world that way. Think about it... With nothing but progress behind us, some people see nothing but doom and the destruction of photography in the future. How odd?

I'll 100% admit that it is becoming easier. But isn't anything that removes barriers to overly technical and complex areas, in a hobby or job, a good thing? Hasn't it happened in every single aspect of our lives? Many of you reading this would never have taken up photography or photo editing at all, if it weren't for improvements in cameras, computers and software. Try having a good photo workflow in 2001. It didn't exist!

Good Will Always Prevail

Good always wins over evil right? :) I'll start wrapping this up by saying great photography will always win. I have yet to see a contest winner or scroll through photo websites or social media and be wowed at bad photos that were simply fixed with computer editing. I see photos all the time where people have done crazy amounts of editing and you know what...it ALWAYS looks like it–100% of the time. A great landscape photo can be made better with a sky replacement, but you still need great light and you need to be in a great place. No sky can hold an amazing landscape photo alone. So what if you do a sky replacement? I'm sorry to say. But on a lackluster subject, it won't make a difference.

Great wildlife photos come that way out of the camera. I'm sorry to tell you that NOBODY has made an award winning wildlife photo in Photoshop. If you didn't take a photo of a great subject, doing something great, in at least "okay" light, no amount of editing will make it great.

You Are In Charge Of How You Feel

I'll finish with this. You are in charge of how you feel about your photography. The vast majority of people reading this are into photography because they like it, not because you're doing it for a business. So let me ask you: Why do you care what AI is doing to other people's photography? It's not

your place to judge anyone's photos. No program **REQUIRES** you to use it. So if you don't like it, simply don't use it, and stop worrying about what some one else is doing.

Contests are notorious for archaic rules. So if you enter contests, you're a **LONG** way away from having AI-edited photos to compete with. So you've got nothing to worry about there.

If you're a working photographer, I hate to tell you –suck it up. Every job in the world gets made simpler by technology. And the people that are good, figure it out and excel in the new landscape. The ones that complain about "how we used to do it" get left behind. AI is here—it's not going away—so figure it out or get ready to be left behind—and if you're one of the ones complaining I hate to tell you but you're on the brink of getting left behind if you haven't been already.

Lastly... I believe, for the most part, that happiness is a choice. And in photography, for some one that is simply doing it because it's enjoyable for them, you can choose to be happy and ignore all the AI stuff. Or you can choose to complain about how it's ruining photography (even though it has zero impact on you).

Final Harsh Advice


So I'll finish with some harsh advice. Mind your own business and don't worry about what anyone else is doing. If you want to "walk to school, uphill, both ways, in the rain, snow and blazing sun all in one day, like you did when you were a kid"—go for it! No software you use requires you to use their AI features. So forget about the features you don't like – use the tools the way you want to use them, and **CHOOSE** to be happy with your photography and photo editing.

HOW DO OUR COMPETITIONS ACTUALLY WORK?

For those of you have wondered how we handle our digital competitions, here is the answer...

Do you wonder why your images have to be in by Saturday midnight before the competition? Well, our Digital Chair, Sean Sullivan, downloads all of the images and forwards them to Wednesday's judge. This gives the judge a lot of time to review the images, score them and provide valuable critique at our virtual meetings.

You should be aware that this is generally very different from the way other clubs handle competitions. Judges do not get the images in advance. They see them for the first time on competition night (either virtually or live), and must quickly provide a score. Sometimes they are permitted a quick "run through."

The link above details everything you need to know about how our competitions are run, including scoring:

First Place – 10 Points
Second Place – 7 Points
Third Place – 4 Points
Fourth Place – 3 Points
Fifth Place – 2 Points
Honorable Mention – 1 Point

If the number of entries is 20 or less, first through third places will be awarded. If 21-30 entries are judged, first through fourth places will be awarded. If more than 30, first through fifth places will be awarded.

The number of honorable mentions awarded is at the discretion of the judges and may not exceed the number of places awarded.

Note that once entered, you are giving SPS permission to publish your images in our newsletter and on the website.

SUBMITTING YOUR ENTRIES

Members are permitted to enter a total of four (4) images, two (2) in any one category.

Images that receive a winning place or an honorable mention may not be re-entered in any subsequent monthly Digital Image Group or Print Group competitions in perpetuity (that means forever!). This does not exclude them from any "special" competitions that may be held.

Once your images are submitted you will receive an email confirmation. This is a great opportunity to check whether or not your images were entered in the proper month and category.

It is important that images be sized correctly for viewing. Specific instructions can be found on the SPS website here:

End of Year is handled differently. Members who participated in competitions during the season will receive an email with their submissions from which they can choose those to be entered. Specific instructions will be provided in this email.

WHY COMPETE?

Win, lose or draw, participating in competitions gives you an opportunity to share your work with fellow SPS members. It also provides you (hopefully) with valuable input on how to make your images better and improve your photography.


And, the best part...it gets you out and shooting.



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
