

FINAL "Creating Landscape Photographs with Impact" by Joe Brady May 17, 2023

Landscape Photography can be a great challenge, but is also among the most rewarding photo activities. There are many elements to creating a great photograph, but in many cases we start at a disadvantage because our cameras don't see light and color the way our eyes do.

During these demonstrations, we'll explore how composition, color and light can all come together to create images that draw the viewer into the scene. Using both Lightroom and Photoshop, we will take raw captures that may look disappointing on your camera LCD, but as long as the composition



is sound, we will shape the light, color and crop transform these images into print-worthy photographs!







Landscape photographer, Ian Plant, has a different take on street photography...

I had a great shot set up. The sun was setting behind a vendor cart in the Jamaa el Fna, the great square of Marrakech in Morocco. Smoke was rising from the cart's grill, diffusing the warm light, and long shadows were radiating into the image's lower corners. Everything was almost perfect, and I was just waiting for someone to enter into the image frame on the left edge to fill in the empty space there. And then a guy walked by giving me the finger. That moment perfectly captured the simultaneous joys and challenges of street photography.

photograph. The challenge of street photography — and its unique appeal — is finding a way to turn the mundane things we see every day into art.

Part of what makes street photography special is that it is from the hip, an exercise in capturing unscripted, genuine moments. "Spontaneous truth telling" is at the very core of street photography, but that vital authenticity can be lost when your subject becomes aware of you and your camera (like the guy who gave me the finger in Morocco). I call this the Uncertainty Principle, borrowed from physics.



Street photography is the study of the human condition. But even more than that, street photography involves capturing ephemeral moments when subject matter, mood, composition, and light come together to create a meaningful or artistic



Werner Heisenberg, a German physicist, determined that our observations have an effect on the behavior of subatomic particles (P.S. I am not a physicist, so if I don't quite get this right, please

forgive me). Bounce a beam of light off of a particle to measure it, and you gently nudge its position or velocity, meaning that your observations of either are never quite 100% accurate. Basically, this Uncertainty Principle dictates that, to a certain extent, the act of observing alters the reality being observed (at least at the subatomic level).

captured. Although it is true that in the U.S. and many other countries you have a legal right to take photos of people in public spaces, just because you can doesn't mean that an individual's personal privacy concerns are irrelevant. I'm certainly not saying that one should never take

Unfortunately, what holds true for electrons and quarks and the many flavors of bosons also holds true for human beings. If you point a camera at a person to take a photo, and they become aware of this fact, then they change their behavior. Once this has happened, the truth of your subject you are trying to capture is altered.

The best street photos, then (one could argue), are candid shots made when your subject is unaware that their picture is being taken. But, if they are unaware, that means they cannot consent to having their likeness

images of people without their consent, but if you are going to do street photography, you need to first recognize that the act of taking a clandestine, candid photo of a stranger is not without its moral ambiguities.



pictures of people, I prefer to render my subjects in as abstract a way as possible. I'm not looking to take a photo of a person, exactly, but rather I am interested in the interaction of shapes, colors, and light. That's why I like to work with long

exposures with people so that they are creatively blurred, or to capture them in silhouette or with their faces hidden from view.

Of course, one can't always render human subjects as pure abstractions. But, I think it is fair to say I'm looking for a version of reality which is fleeting, ephemeral, and less than fully solid—whether photographing nature or the human element. But, regardless of how my final photos are rendered, I believe that something is lost when my subjects become aware that I am taking photos. I prefer to capture moments that are spontaneous, unscripted, and genuine.

I have to admit, this makes me uncomfortable when I'm taking street photos, and I often feel a bit sheepish about "stealing" from people in this way. This is part if the reason why, when taking





There are some street photographers who approach their potential subjects, striking up a conversation and getting consent before starting to take photos. This is certainly an option, but the end result is often photos that are posed and staged. There's nothing wrong with this, and I've done my fair share, usually when doing travel photography. This different approach leads to different photographic outcomes, however, and spontaneity can easily be lost.

The Uncertainty Principle poses both artistic and moral challenges when taking street photos. If you want to take unscripted photos of the wonderful tapestry of the human condition being constantly woven around you, then a clandestine approach is necessary. That said, I think you need to do your best to respect the people you are photographing, to avoid harassing them, and to make sure that your photos don't embarrass them or reduce their dignity. And by all means, if they figure out that you are taking their photo and object, respect their wishes. You've already fallen victim to the Uncertainty

Principle at that point anyways, so there's really no reason not to move on. There's always more to discover in the wide world of photographic opportunity out there.



HOW DO OUR COMPETITIONS ACTUALLY WORK?*

For those of you have wondered how we handle our digital competitions, here is the answer... https://spsphoto.org/competitions/digital-image/digital-image-competition-rules/

Do you wonder why your images have to be in by Saturday midnight before the competition? Well, our Digital Chair, Sean Sullivan, downloads all of the images and forwards them to Wednesday's judge. This gives the judge a lot of time to review the images, score them and provide valuable critique at our virtual meetings.

You should be aware that this is generally very different from the way other clubs handle competitions. Judges do not get the images in advance. They see them for the first time on competition night (either virtually or live), and must quickly provide a score. Sometimes they are permitted a quick "run through."

The link above details everything you need to know about how our competitions are run, including scoring: First Place – 10 Points
Second Place – 7 Points
Third Place – 4 Points
Fourth Place – 3 Points
Fifth Place – 2 Points
Honorable Mention – 1 Point

If the number of entries is 20 or less, first through third places will be awarded. If 21-30 entries are judged, first through fourth places will be awarded. If more than 30, first through fifth places will be awarded.

The number of honorable mentions awarded is at the discretion of the judges and may not exceed the number of places awarded.

Note that once entered, you are giving SPS permission to publish your images in our newsletter and on the website.

SUBMITTING YOUR ENTRIES

Members are permitted to enter a total of four (4) images, two (2) in any one category.

Images that receive a winning place or an honorable mention may not be re-entered in any subsequent monthly Digital Image Group or Print Group competitions in perpetuity (that means forever!). This does not exclude them from any "special" competitions that may be held.

Once your images are submitted you will receive an email confirmation. This is a great opportunity to check whether or not your images were entered in the proper month and category. It is important that images be sized correctly for viewing. Specific instructions can be found on the SPS website here:

End of Year is handled differently. Members who participated in competitions during the season will receive an email with their submissions from which they can choose those to be entered. Specific instructions will be provided in this email.

WHY COMPETE?





OUR JUDGE

Lawrence White Fine Art Photography

After 4 years of military service during the Viet Nam War Era, Lawrence White received an MFA in film from the San Francisco Art Institute (75).

Since that time Mr. White's photography has been seen worldwide in publications that include Time Magazine, Rolling Stone, Vogue, Vanity Fair, Le Monde, Der Spiegel, George, NY Times, Boston Globe, San Francisco Chronicle to name only a few.

For a period of time in the late 1970s and early 1980s, Mr. White served as a staff photographer, at Rolling Stone Magazine. After that experience, Mr. White continued to work in New York City capturing images for several agencies worldwide and serving as a fine art photographic printer for an exclusive list of clients.

In 2001 Mr. White won an N.Y. Press Association Award for photographs captured in his downtown NYC neighborhood during, and after the terrorist attacks of 9-11-01.

Mr. White is also an accomplished filmmaker who has won awards from the American Film Institute, Chicago Museum of Art, and the Seattle Film Festival among others. Mr. White writes and performs the soundtrack music for many of his films.

Mr. White also teaches photography courses and workshops. These have included Adirondack College, Saratoga Arts, Art Center of the Capital Region and The School of the Arts / Museum of Dance.

Mr. White was the Chief Photographer for Saratoga Living Magazine for nearly 15 years. Current photographer/writer for 518Profiles Magazine.
