EVENT FIRST STOP LAST STOP: From Project to Book by Rita Nannini / March 26 - on Zoom

Ten years. 8,000 photographs. 665 miles of New York City subway track. These statistics represent the passion and dedication of Brooklyn-based photographer Rita Nannini for her monumental

achievement to photograph the first stop and last stop of every single subway line in all five boroughs of New York City.

The idea for First Stop Last Stop was conceived when Nannini heard about "End of the Line," a game played by teenagers who randomly board any train and stay on it to its end point. Compelled by curiosity and imagining the myriad visual possibilities, in 2013 Nannini began riding and photographing the terminal stops of all of New York City's subway lines.

Nannini's colorful, panoramic images gathered together in First Stop Last Stop, her first monograph, reveal how the subway bonds communities to each other and the edges of the city.

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

In her Afterword for the book, she writes about the literal and also humanistic connecting elements that the subway represents. "People exhibit immense pride in their neighborhoods, their first stop on a journey to all that New York City has to offer."

On March 26th, Rita will speak on the development of this project as well as her experience into creating her first book.







Rita Nannini is a conceptual documentary photographer who lives in Brooklyn. Rita became a photographer well before she owned a camera. While study-

ing in Madrid, she realized that words could not capture that which her eyes saw: this led to her study of photography and a career in documentary, portrait and performance photography. Originally drawn to the medium as a vehicle to capture otherness, her personal work focuses on the vernacular.

Rita's documentary work has been exhibited and published widely in the United States and internationally. Seeking A Better Life: Jewish Poultry Farmers in New Jersey, her extensive and revealing study, premiered at the New Jersey State Museum, Trenton, NJ and traveled over seven years to 14 locations.



Rita's project First Stop Last Stop documents all the terminal stops of the New York City Subway system. She was awarded a New York City Artists Corp Grant in August 2021 and recently released a photobook of the same name in April 2023. First Stop Last Stop sold out in 10 months.

She has exhibited at the Brooklyn Museum, the Griffin Museum, the Los Angeles Center for Photography, Photoville, Princeton University, Beit Hatfutsot in Tel Aviv and Konica Minolta Plaza in Tokyo. Her work has appeared in many major international publications: CNN, Smithsonian, The New York Times, The Philadelphia Inquirer, Newsweek and more.

Rita has also received grants for her photography from the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities. She is a Professional Member of the American Society of Media Photographers, New York Chapter.

All you need to know about the 2025 Photo Essay Competition

Photo Essay

Digital Essays are a collection of images that will be projected in some fashion, typically, but not necessarily, accompanied by a soundtrack. The presentation should be in a format that is compatible with the projection equipment available on the night of the competition (i.e. .mov or .mp4). To ensure compatibility with the club's hardware and software, Digital Essays must be submitted prior to the competition date. Members will be notified in advance of the required deadline.

Print Essays are a collection of prints displayed in some fashion, including a book (such as available from vendors including Shutterfly, Snapfish, Blurb, and others), a poster, a storyboard, or any method of presenting a collection of prints that can be physically managed by the entrant.

The rules for entry are as follows:

- 1. One entry per person per category [print and digital].
- 2. The maximum length of a digital projected essay is 8 minutes. The maximum dimensions of the projected essay is 1920×1080. Suggested and preferred length is 3 to 5 minutes.
- 3. Participants are encouraged to use only their own images. Other images may be used only if they are vital to the narrative quality of the essay. Any images not made by the participant must be credited. No more than 10% of the total images may be non-participant images.
- 4. It is the participant's responsibility to know the rules. Submissions outside of these guidelines will not be accepted. Digital essays must be submitted by the previously announced entry deadline, which will be no later than midnight the Saturday before the competition date. (The earlier the better). This is to ensure compatibility with the club's hardware and software.




Photo Essay Judge: Cindy Schultz




President, Joe Cotroneo, introduced Joe Cotroneo, who gave us a presentation on his new foray into Infrared Photography.

F@CUS ON My Life in Photo Essays



I didn't call it a "photo essay" back then...just a way to organize and present some photos with music. My first was back in 2007. Since my serious foray into photography was macro (inspired by my early mentor, Nancy Rotenberg), it's no surprise that "Flower


Girl" was my first attempt at a photo essay. Not concerned with copyright issues (it wasn't really going anywhere) I used the song "Flower Girl" by the Cowsills...a favorite of mine. It was pretty successful, and I have used it a number of times in my Flower Photography presentations.

From the very beginning I have used Fotomagico by Boinx (a Mac program) to create my digital essays. It is fairly intuitive and easy to sync music to the slides. Sadly, due to an unknown glitch, I am unable to open my second slide show "Somewhere in my Memory." The music is the John Williams instrumental from Home Alone, and the essay included a number of my favorite images at the time. (I do have all the images if I want to recreate the essay.)



Later that year, to commemorate my first photography excursions to Yellowstone with my significant other I created an essay called "Yellowstone-Two Seasons, Two Photographers." It included photos from our photo workshops in January and June, 2007.



2008 was the first time I used my Fotomagico skills to create a presentation for a memorial service. My dearest friend and photo companion, Stanley Benerofe, passed away unexpectedly. I arranged a gathering of friends to celebrate his life. The almost 30-minute slide show had two sections. It began with Stanley's photographs and ended with my memories of him from 1966 to 2008. At a total of 305 slides and six songs, it is, by far, my most extensive photo essay. And I do watch it often!

Later in 2008 Rob Thomas' song, "New York Christmas" inspired me to create an essay with images from the Train Show at the New York Botanical Gardens and a visit to Central Park.



Another personal tragedy inspired me to create a small essay on my beautiful Maltese puppy that I lost at seven months old. "All About Annie" to the tune, "Thank you for Being a Friend" by Andrew



Gold is another one I watch occasionally. You may remember this theme song from *The Golden Girls*.


In 2012 I took a big leap and moved from Westchester to my home in Guilderland. Billy Joel's "New York State of Mind" was the theme for my essay, "I NY."



So here I am in the Capital District and a new member of the Schenectady Photographic Society. From what I can see in my Fotomagico folder, it appears that my entry on Chanticleer Gardens in 2015 was the first into an SPS Digital Photo Essay Competition. I used "Summer Rain," an original piece that I found on the Internet (I secured permission from the artist) as well as the instrumental, "A Summer Place." This was followed by "The Art of Photo Art" in 2016, which detailed my creation of digital photo art in Photoshop (before and afters).

My 2025 entry this season will be a winter one, but the first winter theme photo essay was my 2021 presentation on "Discovering Steinmetz Park" in Schenectady. This is also my first try at using royalty-free music. I have to admit that I do prefer copyrighted music, since the lyrics are often perfect matches for my presentations. However, since our essays are posted on the Internet, we were advised not to use copyrighted music.



I have found it challenging to find music that enhances and complements my images. For the past few seasons I have used Uppbeat (https:// uppbeat.io/). You can subscribe for the month for \$6.99, or get three free downloads. The subscription service includes a wider selection of tunes. It's kind of fun finding music that "works." You can put in certain keywords (i.e, inspirational, orchestral, uplifting, hopeful, piano, etc., etc.). If you find something you like, you can ask for others that are similar. I generally choose three or four and place them in my slide show to see what fits best. They are usually around 2-3 minutes in length, but you can repeat them (or loop). I do believe the choice of music, and syncing them to your images, definitely brings your photo essay to the next

iPHONE-TOGRAPHY: PROJECT CONDUIT Discovering new light by: Tony Kuyper

Creativity is seeing what others see and thinking what no one else ever thought. - Albert Einstein

I'll be honest and admit that I struggle to think outside the box with photography. I tend to stick with traditional subjects, mostly nature and lately some architecture. I generally like the results, especially after processing the raw files, so there isn't an impetus to change. So, while Einstein's quote is aspirational, its practical application can be difficult. You can't wake up one day and simply say, "I'm going to think different from now on," and instantly be successful at it. It takes some practice and exercise.

The iPhone · tography: 20 reasons to try it article discusses the incentives and rationale to consider using a smartphone for photography. However, I think it misses an important point, which is: Using a smartphone camera changes the way you THINK about photography. Some of the 20

reasons in the article are alluding to this, but it's worth emphasizing this point because, as Einstein seemed to know, thinking differently is at the heart of the creative process.

A smartphone is constantly with you, so you can photograph in places where you never had access to a camera previously and where you might not even consider taking one. Anything and everything now becomes a potential subject for photography. It's just necessary to shift from seeing things as objects and start thinking of them as photographs. This is how my old iPhone helped me to find a new photographic interest: conduit.

Yes, that's right. Conduit. Those metal pipes clinging to the outer (and inner) walls of buildings that provide a rigid enclosure for electrical wires. While I've spent decades happily photographing nature, I'm now equally interested in photographing conduit. That probably would not have happened with a "real" camera. The iPhone made it possible.



Some might now be thinking that perhaps it would be better to NOT experiment with smartphone photography if this is where it leads. Nature photographer turned conduit photographer seems like a step in the wrong direction, doesn't it? However, stop and consider all those absolutely gorgeous nature photographs you see online and you'll realize that most nature photographers are seeing and thinking the same way, i.e., nature is beautiful and a nature pictures need to be processed to convey that beauty. The results can be spectacular, but they're not really seeing something new or thinking all that differently about the subject.

Don't get me wrong, I love looking at nature photographs as much as anyone and will likely continue to photograph nature subjects for the rest of my life, but they don't exude the same sense of creativity for me that they once did. They're like a greatest hits album that I've already listened to hundreds times. I love the music but already know the lyrics and notes by heart. There simply isn't as much discover as there once was.



Conduit, on the other hand, is new, unexplored territory. Sort of the unknown indie band of photography. admit that didn't have any interest in it as photographic subject or consider it as a project before

actually taking a picture of it. That happened when I snapped an image of some conduit with my iPhone when leaving a concert. The processed image ("Outer Art") was a pleasant surprise and helped me to start thinking differently about conduit. Something I used to ignore suddenly became a lot more interesting because my iPhone was there at the

right time.

As a photographer, this is exciting! Here's a subject of nearly unlimited supply that interacts with light in ways that can be ideal for photographs, and (bonus!) it doesn't have a big presence on Instagram. There's a sense of taking something quite ordinary and turning it into art. (IMPORTANT NOTE: After starting to photograph conduit, I think the trades people who install it deserve the title "artist" as much as anyone.) I still shoot nature and architecture, but I also trek to nearby locations where I hope to find high concentrations of conduit. I would not have gotten here with a regular camera. The iPhone was the conduit that helped me to think differently, even creatively, about conduit.

SUMMARY: The opportunity to be creative is a primary reason many photographers take pictures. Because of its size and accessibility, a smartphone camera is ideal for exploring new subjects and new light. It's the perfect tool to encourage thinking differently about things we see every day. It can change your photographic perspective, thereby expanding your creative horizons.

I hope you'll give it a try.

ABOUT TONY KUYPER

Tony's body of work centers around the desert sandstone of the Colorado Plateau and is as beautiful as it is definitive. In addition to his photography, Tony is well known to outdoor photographers for his skills in the realm of digital image developing, specifically in the use of luminosity mask techniques. (Tony is the creator of the "TK Panel" used by many professional photographers.) His popular tutorials and Photoshop actions are well regarded by many of the best contemporary nature and landscape photographers.

PRINT AND DIGITAL COMPETITIONS 2024-2025 SEASON

For the 2024-2025 season we will again hold print competitions in person at First United Methodist Church. Digital Competitions will continue on Zoom. Both will have an Assigned Topic component. NOTE SOME RULE CHANGES BELOW.

PRINT COMPETITIONS:

With the exception of our opening meeting, Print competitions will be held on the first Wednesday of the month. As many of you know, making a print is an art in itself...choosing the size and the paper are just as important as composition.

Members may submit up to **four (4)** images in our Print Competitions. Categories will include General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. You may submit up to **(2)** in any category. For example, two in Monochrome and one each in Assigned Topic and General.

Prints must measure at least 5" x 7" or a maximum of 18" x 24". They can be matted and mounted on mat board, foam core or stretched canvas. Mounts must be a minimum of 8" x 10" and may not exceed 16" x 24".

Prints MUST include an Entry Card affixed to the back in the upper left corner. For your convenience, a copy of the Print Competition Entry Card (4-up) is included on the following page.

We hope you will consider entering prints this season. Check out the Print Competition Rules on our website for additional details.

DIGITAL COMPETITIONS:

We will be continuing our Digital Competitions on Zoom. With the exception of our opening meeting, Digital Competitions will be held on the second Wednesday of the month. As with prints, Digital Competitions will contain three categories: General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. Participants may enter a total of **four (4)** images, with a maximum of **two (2)** in any category.

Digital images should be jpeg, sRGB color space and sized no more than 2800 pixels wide and no more than 1800 pixels high. Maximum file size is 10MB.

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HOW DO OUR COMPETITIONS ACTUALLY WORK?

Do you wonder why your images have to be in by Saturday midnight before the competition? Well, our Digital Chair, Sean Sullivan, downloads all of the images and forwards them to Wednesday's judge. This gives the judge a lot of time to review the images, score them and provide valuable critique at our virtual meetings.

You should be aware that this is generally very different from the way other clubs handle competitions. Judges do not get the images in advance. They see them for the first time on competition night (either virtually or live), and must quickly provide a score. Sometimes they are permitted a quick "run through."

The links above detail everything you need to know about how our competitions are run, including scoring: First Place – 10 Points
Second Place – 7 Points
Third Place – 4 Points
Fourth Place – 3 Points
Fifth Place – 2 Points
Honorable Mention – 1 Point

If the number of entries is 20 or less, first through third places will be awarded. If 21-30 entries are judged, first through fourth places will be awarded. If more than 30, first through fifth places will be awarded.

The number of honorable mentions awarded is at the discretion of the judges and may not exceed the number of places awarded.

Note that once entered, you are giving SPS permission to publish your images in our newsletter and on the website. Copyright remains with the photographer.

SUBMITTING YOUR ENTRIES

For Print, members are permitted to enter a total of four (4) images, two (2) in any one category. For Digital you can enter up to four (4) images, two (2) in any one category.

Images that receive a winning place or an honorable mention may not be re-entered in any subsequent monthly Digital Image Group or Print Group competitions in perpetuity (that means forever!). This does not exclude them from any "special" competitions that may be held.

Once your images are submitted you will receive an email confirmation. This is a great opportunity to check whether or not your images were entered in the proper month and category.

It is important that digital images be sized correctly for viewing. Specific instructions can be found on the SPS website here:

End of Year is handled differently. Members who participated in digital competitions during the season will receive an email with their submissions from which they can choose those to be entered. Rule links in the page heading provide details.

WHY COMPETE?

Win, lose or draw, participating in competitions gives you an opportunity to share your work with fellow SPS members. It also provides you (hopefully) with valuable input on how to make your images better and improve your photography.

And, the best part...it gets you out and shooting.

Assigned Topics especially get you photographing out of your comfort zone.

We hope to see more members participating this season.
