- Each maker may submit up to **ONE** entry in each of the Print of the Year categories.
- One General Print of the Year and one Monochrome Print of the Year will be awarded..





FOCUS ON From Barbershop to Brownie: The Legacy of Henry Lewis Austin And Julia Baldwin Vanderwerker Austin by Kim Koza

My great-grandfather, Henry Lewis Austin, was a man of intriguing contradictions. Family lore tells of a charming, if somewhat roguish, figure-a philanderer, they say, and certainly the reason for my great-grandmother, Julia Baldwin Vanderwerker, being 29 years younger and his third wife. But beyond the romantic entanglements, a compelling story emerges: the story of a man who transformed himself from a barber-surgeon into a dedicated photographer and the woman with whom he chose to share this journey.

Imagine, if you will, the 1800s, where barbers wielded razors for more than just

shaves. They were allowed to perform minor surgeries and even pull teeth. Henry, with his limited formal education, began his career in this very profession. But the allure of the art of photography proved too strong. He possessed a natural talent, a keen eye, and a desire to capture the world through a lens.

After his marriage to Julia in 1908, they ventured from Stillwater, NY, to Rhinebeck, NY. There, Henry's talent was recognized by the elite. He was commissioned to photograph the grand estates along the Hudson River,

the homes of the Astors and Vanderbilts. This success led him to open a studio on Fifth Avenue in New York City. However, a violent robbery, a stark reminder of the city's dangers, forced him to reconsider his path.

He returned to his roots in Rensselaer County, settling in Berlin, NY, known then as the "Gladiola Capital of the World." Here, he and Julia established a combined photography studio and general store within an old factory, its expansive windows and skylight providing the perfect stage for their portrait work.

Julia, a skilled photographer in her own right, was his partner in every sense of the word, and they both meticulously printed and then, at

times, even hand-colored some of their black and white prints before delivering them to the customer.

Their daughter, my grandmother, Coline Winifred Austin D'Avignon, born in 1912, became Henry's favorite subject. We are fortunate to have a rich collection of his plate glass negatives, many featuring Coline. I do find the historical relevance of their lives and mine to be remarkably similar. In

some of Henry's photographs of my grandmother, I see that familiar look on her face: a child's exasperation at being asked to pose, yet again for photos. This is a look I've seen

and captured countless times on my own daughter's face, in my 33-year career as a professional portrait photographer.

It was a profound experience for me to print Henry and Julia's negatives in my own basement darkroom, a tangible connection to the past; to the days of film, light sensitive papers and chemical baths. Recently, my mother, Claudette Koza, and I were fortunate to be able to donate the majority of Henry and Julia's glass plate negatives to the NYS Museum.



TURN DIGITAL IMAGES INTO TANGIBLE TREASURES by Joe Brady

I don't remember the first time I printed one of my landscape shots. I'm fairly sure that it was an image of sailboats sitting in a quiet harbor in Cape Cod. The shapes and the colors stopped me in my tracks, and I simply had to first take, and then print that shot. This one frame in particular struck a chord with me. I printed it, framed it, and hung it.

And something happened.

Every time I walked past it, I paused. Not because it was the best photo I'd ever taken–but because it reminded me why I picked up a camera in the first place.

2. It Reignites the Joy That Got You Into Photography in the First Place

When you print your work, you create something

1. Printing Grounds You in the Experience, Not Just the Image

Digital files are fleeting. We shoot, we scroll, and often, we forget. But the moment you turn a photo into something tangible-something you can touch,

frame, and place on your wall–you give it permanence. That permanence reconnects you with the moment you pressed the shutter.

You're not just printing pixels. You're printing a memory. A feeling. A moment when the light hit just right and the world seemed to slow down, or perhaps it made you slow down. And whether it's a 5x7 print on your desk or a 24x36 canvas over your mantle, that image becomes a portal. One that

brings you back to how it felt to be there - those feelings are what make you a better photographer.

something deeply fulfilling about that. For many of us, photography began as a way to slow down, to explore, to see differently. But over time, as gear gets fancier and editing more complex, it's easy to lose that spark.

Seeing your work

printed-not just on a screen, but framed and displayed-reminds you of the joy of the process. It reconnects you with your original why. You start to notice how far you've come. And suddenly, the effort you've put in feels worth it. That sense of pride and progress? It's fuel. And it keeps you moving forward.

3. It Helps You Learn What Really Matters in Your Images

There's a quiet kind of clarity that comes from seeing your photo in print. When it's on a screen, it's easy to overlook flaws or skip past subtleties. We take so many images that if they don't initially appear perfect, they get ignored or thrown into the digital trash can. Once your photo is on paper, every detail demands attention-sharpness, composition, color, emotion.

Printing forces you to slow down and see like an artist. You start asking questions: Why does this image work? What mood does it convey? What story does it tell? And those questions sharpen your eye for future shoots.

In short, printing teaches you to edit with intention and shoot with purpose. That's how you become a better photographer.

What This Means for Landscape Photographers

Now, if you're a landscape photographer like mewhen you are out there watching the chasing light in the Grand Tetons, marveling at the sandstone pillars and arches in Arches National Park or capturing soft light on guiet coastal evenings-printing your images is more than a technical step. It's an emotional reward

1. It Connects You to the Land in a Deeper Way

When you print a landscape photo, you're not just printing scenery. You're printing an experience. The journey, the hike, the stillness of the air, the anticipation as you waited for the light to shift. Seeing it on your wall is a daily reminder that you were there. That you didn't just take a photo-you created something that holds meaning.


And let's be honest: that feeling never gets old.

2. It Builds Confidence in Your Craft

There's something powerful about seeing your own landscape work displayed in your home. It doesn't have to be gallery-worthy. It just has to mean something to you. That kind of validation isn't

you're improving, that your images are getting stronger, and that you're capable of creating art that belongs in a frame.

For photographers who've spent a lifetime mastering other fields, this confidence in a creative pursuit is deeply fulfilling. It becomes a new kind of achievement - one measured not in metrics, but in meaning.

3. It Leaves a Legacy - One Print at a Time

Think about the long game. A printed photo has staying power. It's not going to get buried in a hard drive or lost in the cloud. It becomes part of your home, your story, your legacy. A print is an enduring reminder of both you and the feeling you had for the place.

Imagine your extended family walking through the house, stopping at a large framed shot of The Matterhorn, Bryce Canyon or Monument Valley, and saying, "Grandpa took that." That's not just photography, that's both a connection and a deeper insight into what makes you tick

Final Thought: Start Small, But Start Now

You don't need a gallery wall to get started. Pick one image that means something to you-maybe from your last trip, or some unexpected scene where the light surprised you. Print it. Frame it. Put it somewhere you'll see it every day.

Diane and I do this every morning when we wake up to a beautiful sunset following a passing storm over the ocean in Provincetown, MA. It's a shot that will never be recreated and presents a unique moment in time.

Let your print remind you that this photography thing is more than just a hobby. It's how you see the world. And sometimes, the best way to keep seeing clearly... is to stop and look at what you've already created.

You already have the eye. Now it's time to celebrate the results.

PRINT AND DIGITAL COMPETITIONS 2024-2025 SEASON

For the 2024-2025 season we will again hold print competitions in person at First United Methodist Church. Digital Competitions will continue on Zoom. Both will have an Assigned Topic component. NOTE SOME RULE CHANGES BELOW.

PRINT COMPETITIONS:

With the exception of our opening meeting, Print competitions will be held on the first Wednesday of the month. As many of you know, making a print is an art in itself...choosing the size and the paper are just as important as composition.

Members may submit up to **four (4)** images in our Print Competitions. Categories will include General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. You may submit up to **(2)** in any category. For example, two in Monochrome and one each in Assigned Topic and General.

Prints must measure at least 5" x 7" or a maximum of 18" x 24". They can be matted and mounted on mat board, foam core or stretched canvas. Mounts must be a minimum of 8" x 10" and may not exceed 16" x 24".

Prints MUST include an Entry Card affixed to the back in the upper left corner. For your convenience, a copy of the Print Competition Entry Card (4-up) is included on the following page.

We hope you will consider entering prints this season. *Check out the Print Competition Rules on our website for additional details.*

DIGITAL COMPETITIONS:

We will be continuing our Digital Competitions on Zoom. With the exception of our opening meeting, Digital Competitions will be held on the second Wednesday of the month. As with prints, Digital Competitions will contain three categories: General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. Participants may enter a total of **four (4)** images, with a maximum of **two (2) in any category.**

Digital images should be jpeg, sRGB color space and sized no more than 2800 pixels wide and no more than 1800 pixels high. Maximum file size is 10MB.

Alternative processes, composites, and manipulations are allowed. <u>Major elements</u> in a print must be the maker's own work and the <u>majority of the elements</u> must be photographic in nature.

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HOW DO OUR COMPETITIONS ACTUALLY WORK?

Do you wonder why your images have to be in by Saturday midnight before the competition? Well, our Digital Chair, Sean Sullivan, downloads all of the images and forwards them to Wednesday's judge. This gives the judge a lot of time to review the images, score them and provide valuable critique at our virtual meetings.

You should be aware that this is generally very different from the way other clubs handle competitions. Judges do not get the images in advance. They see them for the first time on competition night (either virtually or live), and must quickly provide a score. Sometimes they are permitted a quick "run through."

The links above detail everything you need to know about how our competitions are run, including scoring:

First Place – 10 Points Second Place – 7 Points Third Place – 4 Points Fourth Place – 3 Points Fifth Place – 2 Points Honorable Mention – 1 Point

If the number of entries is 20 or less, first through third places will be awarded. If 21-30 entries are judged, first through fourth places will be awarded. If more than 30, first through fifth places will be awarded.

The number of honorable mentions awarded is at the discretion of the judges and may not exceed the number of places awarded.

Note that once entered, you are giving SPS permission to publish your images in our newsletter and on the website. Copyright remains with the photographer.

SUBMITTING YOUR ENTRIES

For Print, members are permitted to enter a total of four (4) images, two (2) in any one category. For Digital you can enter up to four (4) images, two (2) in any one category.

Images that receive a winning place or an honorable mention may not be re-entered in any subsequent monthly Digital Image Group or Print Group competitions in perpetuity (that means forever!). This does not exclude them from any "special" competitions that may be held.

Once your images are submitted you will receive an email confirmation. This is a great opportunity to check whether or not your images were entered in the proper month and category.

It is important that digital images be sized correctly for viewing. Specific instructions can be found on the SPS website here:

End of Year is handled differently. Members who participated in digital competitions during the season will receive an email with their submissions from which they can choose those to be entered. Rule links in the page heading provide details.

WHY COMPETE?

Win, lose or draw, participating in competitions gives you an opportunity to share your work with fellow SPS members. It also provides you (hopefully) with valuable input on how to make your images better and improve your photography.

And, the best part...it gets you out and shooting. Assigned Topics especially get you photographing out of your comfort zone. We hope to see more members participating this season.





OUR JUDGE

Lawrence White Fine Art Photography

After 4 years of military service during the Viet Nam War Era, Lawrence White received an MFA in film from the San Francisco Art Institute (75).

Since that time Mr. White's photography has been seen worldwide in publications that include Time Magazine, Rolling Stone, Vogue, Vanity Fair, Le Monde, Der Spiegel, George, NY Times, Boston Globe, San Francisco Chronicle to name only a few.

For a period of time in the late 1970s and early 1980s, Mr. White served as a staff photographer, at Rolling Stone Magazine. After that experience, Mr. White continued to work in New York City capturing Images for several agencies worldwide and serving as a fine art photographic printer for an exclusive list of clients.

In 2001 Mr. White won an N.Y. Press Association Award for photographs captured in his downtown NYC neighborhood during, and after the terrorist attacks of 9-11-01.

Mr. White is also an accomplished filmmaker who has won awards from the American Film Institute, Chicago Museum of Art, and the Seattle Film Festival among others. Mr. White writes and performs the soundtrack music for many of his films.

Mr. White also teaches photography courses and workshops. These have included Adirondack College, Saratoga Arts, Art Center of the Capital Region and The School of the Arts / Museum of Dance.

Mr. White was the Chief Photographer for Saratoga Living Magazine for nearly 15 years. Current photographer/writer for 518Profiles Magazine.




