



ELEVATE YOUR PHOTOGRAPHY – MASTER THE ART OF BLACK & WHITE by lan Plant

During my entire career as a professional photographer, I have always shot in color. Part of the reason was commercial—I reasoned that color photos were more likely to attract attention—and part of the reason was that, quite simply, I love color. Recently, however, I decided to build a black and white photography portfolio by digging through 20 years' worth of raw photos in my digital archives, something that I started referring to as "Project Monochrome."

"Project Monochrome" has been a continuing effort to dig through tens of thousands of photos to find the diamonds in the rough, the images that I had overlooked before because they just weren't effective in color. Sometimes, I found photos that I had originally shared as color images that I decided had more impact in black and white. Most of the time, however, I discovered photos that failed in color, but that had new life breathed into them when converted to monochrome.

I believe that every photographer should try black & white. In general, artistic photos are made when you stop thinking literally about your subjects; black & white photography, by its very nature, forces us to do that. Since we see in color, B&W photography pushes images into a more abstract space, making us look at the world in a completely different way. This genre is perfect for anyone who wants to improve their general photography, composition, and digital processing skills. Regardless of what you photograph or how experienced you are, there's undoubtedly something special that you can learn from black and white photography.

And how has Project Monochrome changed me as an artist? Well, I still love color photography, but now I equally love black and white. This is the way that I look at it: Now, I have twice as much to photograph, and twice as much that inspires me! It feels like a total creative revival. Believe me, there is nothing that advances your skills as

a photographer more than finding fresh inspiration that forces you to see things in a new light.

What Makes a Good B&W Photo?

While digging through my digital archives, I had to think deeply about the following questions: What actually makes a good B&W photo? How can I improve my B&W photography skills and take more effective monochrome photos?

The short answer is that great B&W images have an artistic and mysterious quality to them. They thrive on contrast

and mystery, and somehow stand outside of time and place. I love making B&W photos when I have moody conditions (such as fog), or harsh contrast between shadow and light.

Rather than asking such obvious questions, though, ask yourself why you want to take B&W photos. Chances are you want to tell a story that means something to you and evokes strong emo-



tions in your photos. That's a good enough reason to get into B&W photography. Again, I want to emphasize that this genre is open to photographers of all kinds. Everyone is welcome, and everyone has the potential to take good B&W photos of their own.

How Can I Improve My B&W Photos?

The great thing about B&W photography is that it doesn't require any special equipment. You can (and should) just use your color digital camera for black & white photography. The key is B&W conversion. Most photo apps and programs allow you to convert photos to black & white, but I personally use the Adobe suite of products (Lightroom or Camera RAW are perfect for most B&W editing, although sometimes I do some finishing work in Photoshop).

As I was looking through my archive to find photos for Project Monochrome, I was sur-

prised to discover hundreds of photos that I had previously overlooked because they didn't look that interesting in color. When I converted them to B&W, however, everything clicked into place!

Before you start converting your photos to B&W, pay attention to tone, contrast, mood, and composition. It might seem like a lot to juggle mentally, but trust me, it gets easier with time! Here's an explanation from my Black & White Photography course:

A scene that looks incredible in color might look dull in B&W, and vice versa. What works best for color photography and for B&W isn't always the same. For example, color photography often looks best in soft or colorful light, while B&W photography goes really well with harsh light that's full of contrast. Understanding the differences between the two will help you make better B&W photos.

Here's another example from my course:

Visual elements that appear separate in color may sometimes merge in tonality when converted to B&W. As a result, some images may look good in color but not so great in B&W, and vice versa. A classic example is a red apple and a green apple side by side. In color, you can easily distinguish between the two: When you convert the photo to B&W, however, both apples end up looking a very similar shade of gray:





Keep in mind that during the processing phase, you can selectively brighten or darken individual color channels, so you can make the red apple look brighter than the green apple. This technique can be used to enhance contrast and visual separation in your B&W images:



Personally, I've found that B&W photography has expanded my range of possibilities. I'm excited to shoot more and discover more about the wonderful world of monochrome. You can learn how to take and digitally process amazing B&W photos of your own with my Black & White Photography Course. This course is filled with detailed processing tutorials, explanations, and techniques that will help you refresh your creative mind and make beautiful B&W photos that draw the viewer in.

RUST: Photographing Decay and Corrosion by Phil Olivo

You've met landscape photographers, street photographers, portrait and event photographers but how many claim the distinction of being called a rust photographer? We are definitely a different breed.

With beauty all around us why invest time, energy and enthusiasm to capture corrosion? We find rust to be compelling. It's more than just corrosion, it's the transformation of a subject which was once perfect to an image that is layered, fickle and compelling to view.

What draws us to rust? Let's start with it's flaky, gritty texture then add it's color palette of oranges, reds, browns and blue.

Don't forget it's compelling narrative of time, neglect, and nature reclaiming what man has made.



Although some of these images were photographed in Scotland and Ireland, you don't have to travel to far away lands to find rusty subjects. Most were captured in the Capital District. Some of my favorite places include roadsides which are ideal for abandoned vehicles, Pebbles Island, the Waterford Canal as well as nature preserves and historic areas.

Be careful of abandoned buildings.

Not only are you trespassing but these buildings can be dangerous.

The abandoned interiors seen in this aticle were taken at Saratoga Homestead with a guided tour and the company of a fellow SPS member.

Equipment? You probably have what you need. These photos were taken with a 27mm fixed lens, a 50-200 telephoto lens as well as my 55-80 walkaround lens. Unless you're doing macro work and need special equipment, you should be all set.

What about composition? Just apply your basic techniques and you'll do fine. Give these tips a try to make your images stand out:

- Forget the object—focus on the surface.
 Zoom in on peeling paint, rivets, and flaking metal to create abstract compositions.
 - Watch your focal point—rusty surfaces can trick auto focus.
 - Pair rust with unexpected elements, such as a flower or clean surface to create visual tension.

A closing thought: consider rust to be your canvas and make the photos yours. Add personal touches like juxtaposing objects and post-processing to enhance color and contrast.

Remember one man's trash is a rust photographer's treasure!



PRINT AND DIGITAL COMPETITIONS 2025-2026 SEASON

For the 2025-2026 season we will again hold print competitions in person at First United Methodist Church. Digital Competitions will continue on Zoom. Both will have an Assigned Topic component.

PRINT COMPETITIONS:

With the exception of our opening meeting, Print competitions will be held on the first Wednesday of the month. As many of you know, making a print is an art in itself...choosing the size and the paper are just as important as composition.

Members may submit up to **four (4)** images in our Print Competitions. Categories will include General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. You may submit up to **(2) in any category**. For example, two in Monochrome and one each in Assigned Topic and General.

Prints must measure at least 5" x 7" or a maximum of 18" x 24". They can be matted and displayed on mat board, foam core or stretched canvas. Mounts must be a minimum of 8" x 10" and may not exceed 18" x 24".

Prints MUST include an Entry Card affixed to the back in the upper left corner. For your convenience, a copy of the Print Competition Entry Card (4-up) is included on the following page.

We hope you will consider entering prints this season. Check out the Print Competition Rules on our website for additional details.

DIGITAL COMPETITIONS:

We will be continuing our Digital Competitions on Zoom. With the exception of our opening meeting, Digital Competitions will be held on the second Wednesday of the month. As with prints, Digital Competitions will contain three categories: General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. Participants may enter a total of **four (4)** images, with a maximum of **two (2)** in any category.

Digital images should be jpeg, sRGB color space and sized no more than 2400 pixels wide and no more than 1800 pixels high. Maximum file size is 10MB.

HOW DO OUR COMPETITIONS ACTUALLY WORK?

Do you wonder why your images have to be in by Saturday midnight before the competition? Well, our Digital Chair, Sean Sullivan, downloads all of the images and forwards them to Wednesday's judge. This gives the judge a lot of time to review the images, score them and provide valuable critique at our virtual meetings.

You should be aware that this is generally very different from the way other clubs handle competitions. Judges do not get the images in advance. They see them for the first time on competition night (either virtually or live), and must quickly provide a score. Sometimes they are permitted a quick "run through."

The links above detail everything you need to know about how our competitions are run, including scoring: First Place – 10 Points
Second Place – 7 Points
Third Place – 5 Points
Fourth Place – 3 Points
Fifth Place – 2 Points
Honorable Mention – 1 Point

If the number of entries is 20 or less, first through third places will be awarded. If 21-30 entries are judged, first through fourth places will be awarded. If more than 30, first through fifth places will be awarded.

The number of honorable mentions awarded is at the discretion of the judges and may not exceed the number of places awarded.

Note that once entered, you are giving SPS permission to publish your images in our newsletter and on the website. Copyright remains with the photographer.

SUBMITTING YOUR ENTRIES

For both Print and Digital, members are permitted to enter a total of four (4) images, two (2) in any one category.

Images that receive a winning place or an honorable mention may not be re-entered in any subsequent monthly Digital Image Group or Print Group competitions in perpetuity (that means forever!). This does not exclude them from any "special" competitions that may be held.

Once your images are submitted you will receive an email confirmation. This is a great opportunity to check whether or not your images were entered in the proper month and category.

It is important that digital images be sized correctly for viewing. Specific instructions can be found on the SPS website here:

End of Year is handled differently. Members who participated in digital competitions during the season will receive an email with their submissions from which they can choose those to be entered. Rule links in the page heading provide details.

WHY COMPETE?

Win, lose or draw, participating in competitions gives you an opportunity to share your work with fellow SPS members. It also provides you (hopefully) with valuable input on how to make your images better and improve your photography.

And, the best part...it gets you out and shooting.

Assigned Topics especially get you photographing out of your comfort zone.

We hope to see more members participating this season.
