

How information overload steals your time, energy and creative confidence—and what to do instead.

The Illusion of "Readiness"

truly great image?

Of course not.

How many times have you met someone who has bought all the "best" and "top-of-the-line gear," yet they seem to always have great difficulties creating a good photo? But do you also need to learn everything about your camera before you can take a

In today's world, we're swimming in information. Tips, gear reviews, YouTube videos, Instagram tl just talked about always wanting our attention. The moment you start learning photography, the floodgates open. Suddenly, you're trying to memorize every camera mode, every Lightroom slider, every rule of composition before you allow yourself to create.

But that's the trap: the belief that you need to know everything before you're allowed to start doing anything. The cost is all that time spent consuming instead of creating, energy wasted switching from one tutorial to the next, never applying what you've learned. Worst of all, confidence that quietly erodes every time you realize you still don't "have it all figured out"

I'm not saying that you shouldn't learn about your camera. Any tool needs to be understood well enough so that it doesn't get in the way of you using it for the job it was built for.

So what do you really need to know? Here's a short list:

- How to use shooting modes Program, Aperture Priority, Shutter Priority and Manual
- How to use exposure compensation and shutter speed overrides when shooting in automatic modes
- 3. How and why to adjust shutter speed, aperture and ISO for the situation at hand
- 4. How to format your memory card
- 5. How to choose and use the focus modes that apply to your type of photography
- 6. Learn how to use and understand the histogram

That's it - at least to get started. The rest is for specific needs such as tracking a bird in flight, astrophotography, etc.

Why High-Achievers Are Especially Vulnerable

Now, some of you are used to mastering complex systems. In medicine, aviation, engineering, mastery often does mean learning everything.

But art doesn't work like that.

Photography isn't surgery. It's storytelling. And creativity thrives in the doing, not the knowing. Yes, you need technical skills. But trying to learn it all before you shoot is like trying to memorize the dictionary before writing your first sentence. You'll never get there, and you will miss out on the discovery that happens through the act of creating.

So What Do You Do Instead?

Pick One Skill to Practice at a Time

Want to master exposure? Focus on light for a week. Not the histogram and dynamic range and zone system. Just observe light: when it's harsh, when it's soft, when it wraps, when it carves.

If your camera is new to you, put it on program mode, and look for light and shadows shapes and elements that draw your eye, and start shooting.

Set Boundaries for Learning:

One tutorial a week. One book at a time. One mentor, not five YouTubers shouting at you with different opinions. Learning is powerful - but only when it's applied.

Shoot With Intent, Not Perfection:

Every time you take your camera out, give yourself one mission. "Today, I'm going to explore foreground elements." Or, "I'm only shooting with one lens." Constraints breed creativity.

Make, Print, Reflect:

Don't let your work live only on a memory card. Print one photo a week. Put it on your wall. That act alone shifts you from student to creator.

Remember Why You Started:

This isn't a race. You didn't pick up photography to become a walking user manual. You did it to feel something, to capture something. Anchor yourself to that purpose when the noise gets loud.

Recover the Color You Felt

White balance is your secret weapon. Often, the default setting makes your photo feel too cool or too clinical. Adjust it until it matches the warmth or coolness of your memory. Unfortunately some places don't give you a true white balance.

When you are in a place like Monument Valley or Arches National Park, you are surrounded by red rocks and red sand. On a sunny day, this reflects up on everything around you. Your eyes (actually, your brain) fixes this for you, your camera can't. Once again, stare at these elements that shouldn't be red or desaturated because of the color of light reflecting up onto them.

Don't Overdo It

Editing is about enhancement, not replacement. You're not inventing a new scene—you're helping the image reflect the moment as you experienced it. What I recommend is to start your image edits, and then walk away - preferably for a day or two-then come back to them. You will find that some of your color adjustments need tweaking or were a bit to over the top.



It's just like writing a first draft.

Come back, and clean it up later.
In the meantime, grab your camera and make some photographs!



The Power of Photography Exhibit @ The Fenimore Museum August 2025 by Kim Koza





We've all seen the photo: Steve Mc-Curry's *Afghan Girl*. But experiencing this extraordinary image in person is an entirely different encounter—astonishingly so.

During my photography career, I have been to a lot of photography exhibits, but only two have impacted me dramatically: (1) Julia Margaret Cameron, an early female photographer, whose work my daughter Jess and I saw at the National Portrait Gallery in London

in 2003, and (2) *WWII - 80 Years*, a black and white exhibit at the Monroe Gallery in Santa Fe, New Mexico in 2025 (an exhibit discovered by happenstance on a search for chile limón pistachios.) I assumed the exhibit at the Fenimore would be just as excellent as these, and it did not disappoint. In fact, it was absolutely remarkable.

We had a lovely drive to the Fenimore Museum in Cooperstown from our home on the Great Sacandaga Lake. It was a beautiful Saturday morning drive with rolling hills, Amish farms, and rural countryside.

During the 2020 COVID pandemic, Peter Fetterman began sharing images in a blog that evolved into a project titled *The Power of Photography.* The project eventually grew into both this exhibition and a book of the same name.

All I can say is, even as I write this months later, I am choked up. Having been a professional photographer for the last 30 years, this exhibit was everything to me. Dave and I spent hours poring over each and every image—reading every caption that went along with them. What a feast for your eyes!

The first shot I saw was Henri Cartier-Bresson's *Queens Charlotte's Ball*; a favorite photographer of mine going back to the 90's. Coincidentally, this is also the only image that I took of the entire exhibition, as immediately after I shot it, I saw the "No Photography Allowed" sign...oops!

We visited a sunflower field in Cooperstown on the way, and while you couldn't enter and could only shoot from the road, it was still a beautiful sight to behold and experience. Then we were off to the Fenimore.

Lucky for us, there was also an art show happening on the grounds, so we enjoyed all the beautiful artwork and I even purchased a small owl watercolor for my daughter. We perused all the exhibits in the museum, letting the excitement build and saving the photography exhibit for last. It was worth the wait.

Seeing the vision and experimentation of early photographers such as Cartier-Bresson, was fascinating. Another standout was the glass plate portrait of Abraham Lincoln taken by Alexander Hessler in 1860. The detail in the texture of his skin and the lines in his face—created all the way back in the 1800s—absolutely blew my

mind, even after having worked professionally in the film days and having previously printed my Great Grandfather's plate glass negatives. The large, imposing portrait of Winston Churchill taken by Yousuf Karsh in 1941 shows Churchill looking stern and almost angry. It becomes even more fascinating when you learn that Karsh had swiftly snatched away Churchill's cigar—worried the smoke would spoil the shot—after Churchill had refused to put it down. Karsh captured that flash of irritation perfectly in Churchill's expression.

Audrey Hepburn with Flowers, 1955, is a stunning creation in pink.

I cried without embarrassment at the picture of Anne Frank's father, standing in the room where they had all lived together, hidden for two years.

And then there was *Afghan Girl*. It was mesmerizing, just staring into her incredible eyes. What a moment, what a capture, what an experience to see it in person.



It takes a lot of imagination to be a good photographer. You need less imagination to be a painter because you can invent things. But in photography everything is so ordinary. It takes a lot of looking before you learn to see the extraordinary.


F@CUS ON Whose Work Was That? by Dave Koschnick

It was mid-May 2007, and I was day hiking in the Adirondack Mountain Reserve. My hiking partner and I turned off the Lake Road and headed up Gull Brook to see Artists Falls. After decades photographing on film, I was beginning to move to digital. I had a Nikon D200 with a Nikon 18-70 zoom. I was shooting in JPG format as I had not learned how to process raw images. My hiking stick had a removable knob that let me use it as a monopod for the camera. The metadata tells me I was shooting at ISO 100, 18mm, f/8.0 and 1/60 second.

I thought the image was ok for a rank amateur, so I made a print and took it to the office. One lady saw it and wanted a print and could I use a light purple mat to match the wallpaper in her house. I put it together and sold it to her at my cost.

A few weeks later I heard her telling another worker about her husband's reaction to it. It seems that she had wrapped it up and gave it to him as an anniversary present. Upon opening it he said, "You spent too much!" She replied, "No I didn't." He came back with "Yes you did. I know what Nathan Farb goes for."

I, of course, was greatly flattered; but I imagine if Nathan Farb saw the image and heard the story—he would have rightly been insulted.





PRINT AND DIGITAL COMPETITIONS 2025-2026 SEASON

For the 2025-2026 season we will again hold print competitions in person at First United Methodist Church. Digital Competitions will continue on Zoom. Both will have an Assigned Topic component.

PRINT COMPETITIONS:

With the exception of our opening meeting, Print competitions will be held on the first Wednesday of the month. As many of you know, making a print is an art in itself...choosing the size and the paper are just as important as composition.

Members may submit up to **four (4)** images in our Print Competitions. Categories will include General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. You may submit up to **(2)** in any category. For example, two in Monochrome and one each in Assigned Topic and General.

Prints must measure at least 5" x 7" or a maximum of 18" x 24". They can be matted and displayed on mat board, foam core or stretched canvas. Mounts must be a minimum of 8" x 10" and may not exceed 18" x 24".

Prints MUST include an Entry Card affixed to the back in the upper left corner. For your convenience, a copy of the Print Competition Entry Card (4-up) is included on the following page.

We hope you will consider entering prints this season. Check out the Print Competition Rules on our website for additional details.

DIGITAL COMPETITIONS:

We will be continuing our Digital Competitions on Zoom. With the exception of our opening meeting, Digital Competitions will be held on the second Wednesday of the month. As with prints, Digital Competitions will contain three categories: General (i.e., color), Monochrome and Assigned Topic. Participants may enter a total of four (4) images, with a maximum of two (2) in any category.

Digital images should be jpeg, sRGB color space and sized no more than 2400 pixels wide and no more than 1800 pixels high. Maximum file size is 10MB.

HOW DO OUR COMPETITIONS ACTUALLY WORK?

Do you wonder why your images have to be in by Saturday midnight before the competition? Well, our Digital Chair, Sean Sullivan, downloads all of the images and forwards them to Wednesday's judge. This gives the judge a lot of time to review the images, score them and provide valuable critique at our virtual meetings.

You should be aware that this is generally very different from the way other clubs handle competitions. Judges do not get the images in advance. They see them for the first time on competition night (either virtually or live), and must quickly provide a score. Sometimes they are permitted a quick "run through."

The links above detail everything you need to know about how our competitions are run, including scoring: First Place – 10 Points
Second Place – 7 Points
Third Place – 5 Points
Fourth Place – 3 Points
Fifth Place – 2 Points
Honorable Mention – 1 Point

If the number of entries is 20 or less, first through third places will be awarded. If 21-30 entries are judged, first through fourth places will be awarded. If more than 30, first through fifth places will be awarded.

The number of honorable mentions awarded is at the discretion of the judges and may not exceed the number of places awarded.

Note that once entered, you are giving SPS permission to publish your images in our newsletter and on the website. Copyright remains with the photographer.

SUBMITTING YOUR ENTRIES

For both Print and Digital, members are permitted to enter a total of four (4) images, two (2) in any one category.

Images that receive a winning place or an honorable mention may not be re-entered in any subsequent monthly Digital Image Group or Print Group competitions in perpetuity (that means forever!). This does not exclude them from any "special" competitions that may be held.

Once your images are submitted you will receive an email confirmation. This is a great opportunity to check whether or not your images were entered in the proper month and category.

It is important that digital images be sized correctly for viewing. Specific instructions can be found on the SPS website here:

End of Year is handled differently. Members who participated in digital competitions during the season will receive an email with their submissions from which they can choose those to be entered. Rule links in the page heading provide details.

WHY COMPETE?

Win, lose or draw, participating in competitions gives you an opportunity to share your work with fellow SPS members. It also provides you (hopefully) with valuable input on how to make your images better and improve your photography.

And, the best part...it gets you out and shooting.

Assigned Topics especially get you photographing out of your comfort zone.

We hope to see more members participating this season.






